PLAINTIFFS LOSE AUDITORIUM FIGHT

Right of the Elgin School Board to Issue Warrants Is Upheld by Judge

ELGIN, Ore., May 10.—The gymnasium case, in which injunction proceedings were brought before Judge J. W. Knowles in the circuit court at La Grande to restrain the Elgin school board from evicting an auditorium at the high school building, alleging that the school board had no authority under the law to call an election for the issue of warrants for other purposes than the erection of a schoolhouse, was decided today by Judge Knowles. He held that the school board had no authority under the law to call an election for the issue of warrants for other purposes than the erection of a schoolhouse, and that the erection of an auditorium did not come within the meaning of the act; and further, "that there assembled in the room where the election was held a body of persons, some of whom were under the age of 21 years, some of whom were not residents of the district and some of whom were not named on the assessment roll of Union county, and that any person desiring was permitted to be in the said room and vote on any and all motions offered, has been decided in favor of the school board in a decision handed down by Judge Knowles this week.

In his decision Judge Knowles upholds the right of the school board to issue warrants in the sum of \$5,500 for the purpose of building the auditorium, and that the building comes within the meaning of the law defining "school buildings." He holds, also, that the meeting at which the election was held was conducted legally and that all legal formalities were complied with.
