

TIGERS TO SEEK OREGON HONORS

La Grande High to Send Large Track and Field Team to State Meet

Considerable interest is being shown locally in the high school track and field meet to be held at Corvallis, Saturday. La Grande High school, Eastern Oregon champion, will enter a team of 16 men and hopes to gather enough points to place high up among the winners. The Tigers will leave here on the 6:30 train tonight.

Locally it is regarded that La Grande's best bets for points are in the mile and half mile (Anson) the javelin (Charlton and Charlton) and the discus (Charlton and Ketter). The Tigers have several other prospects, including the possibility of Ketter placing in either the 100 or 220 yard dashes, plus in the broad jump, Nowland in the high jump, etc.

La Grande has one state meet record, Lee Smith winning the 440 yard dash last year in 52.4 seconds, which stands as the first record. Several marks are expected to fall this year. The present records follow:

A large silver trophy will be presented by the associated stu-

dents of Oregon State college to the team placing highest in the meet. Another cup has been offered by L. V. Windmiller, vice-principal of Washington high school, Portland, to the winner of the half mile, and another cup will be presented by Dank & Co. of Portland to the winning relay team. Honors will be awarded teams placing second and third in the meet. Gold, silver and bronze medals will be awarded first, second and third place winners, respectively in all the events including the relay.

Arrive on Friday

In addition to the 16 track men that are to go on a special car provided by the U. P. at rates—Tom Bruce, student body president, and Coach Ralph Christie, will make the trip.

J. H. Pearce, local A. A. U. commissioner, is also expected to go to Corvallis for the meet. The Tigers will reach Corvallis about noon on Friday and will have nearly a day's rest before entering the Saturday morning preliminaries. They will take a train immediately after the meet and will arrive in La Grande Sunday in time for baccalaureate services at the L. D. S. tabernacle. The Observer will receive returns on the meet and the final scores may be had Saturday afternoon by calling Main 27.

Huskies En Route To Oregon Field

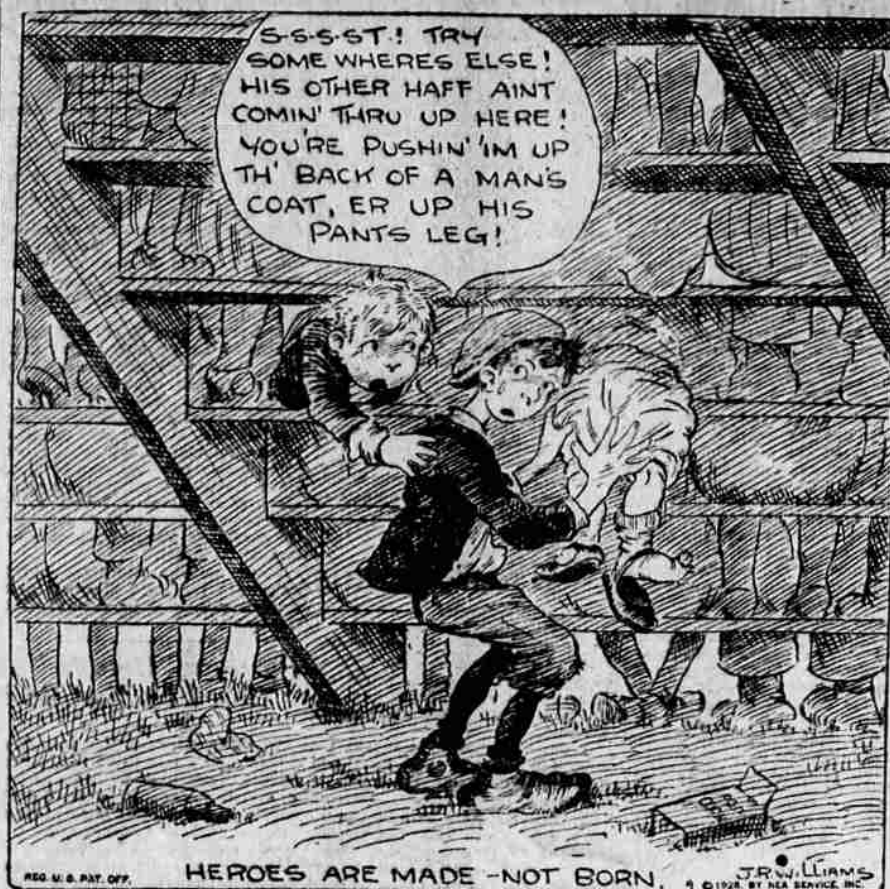

In Seattle at any rate, the Huskies are conceded the victory in the meet, although it appears to be in the hands that Oregon will take the javelin throw, the pole vault and perhaps the quarter-mile and relay runs.

The Braves lost their fifth straight game when Eppa Rixey emerged on top in a pitching battle against Genewick. The score was 4 to 1.

ARMOUR HAS NO CHANCE IN PLAY

U. S. Open Champion Apparently Eliminated—161 in Two Rounds

SANDWICH, Eng., May 10 (AP)—Tommy Armour, open golf champion of the United States took 60 strokes in the second round of the British open today and with a total of 161 for the two rounds apparently was eliminated from further participation in the title event.

The American title holder has played almost steadily since he won the championship at Oakmont, Pa., last summer and seemed overconfident when he came to Great Britain to play for the title.

Jose Jurado, diminutive professional who captured the qualifying round with a real display of fireworks, took a commanding lead today in the second round of the British open golf championship with a total of 145. He turned in a 74 yesterday and a fine 71 today.

After sharp 38 on the outward journey, Jurado's trip home was a procession of pars and birdies.

Barnes Total 151

Among other early finishers were Jim Barnes who got a 73 for a total of 154; Percy Alliss, of Great Britain who got a 76 for a total of 151, and Stewart Burns, Scottish pro, who got a 74 for a total of 150.

Toward noon the weather was more moderate than it had been in the morning and the cold winds had subsided as Walter Hagen started, under almost ideal playing conditions.

Hagen went out in 36. He slipped one over par on the first hole but was back in perfect figures with a birdie at the fourth. He was one over par on the fifth and played the last four of the first nine in par.

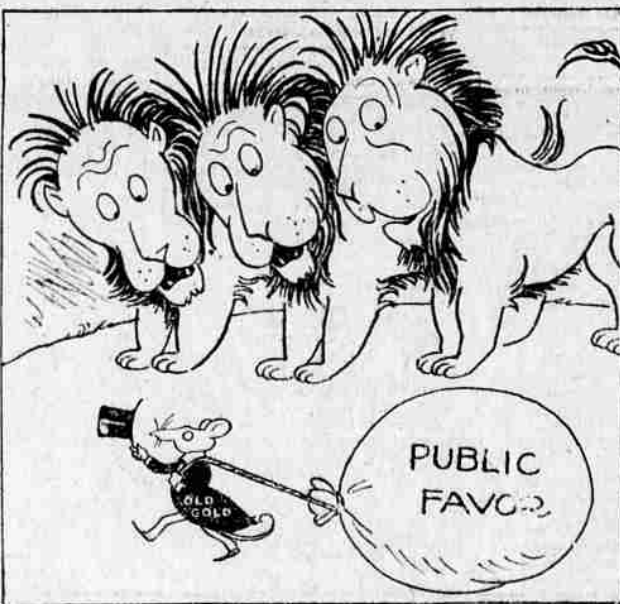
