Winning Streaks of Leaders Threaten to Turn Struggle into a Duel

By the Associated Press. Sensational winning streaks by the New York Yankees and Philadelphia Athletics threaten to turn the American league pennant into a duel instead of a free for all.

The Athletics, after losing their first four games, have won 12 of their last 12. The Yankees have lost but two of their last 12.

George Herman Ruth propelled his seventh homer of the season into the left field bleachers at the Yankee Stadium yesterday, scoring behind two team mates and giving the Yankees a 4 to 2 win over Cleveland.

The Athletics hammered out an 11 to 1 verdict over the St. Louis Browns at Philadelphia.

Joe Hauser hit his sixth homer of the campaign. Bing Miller also kicked in with one.

Tigers Win 6 to 5

Bob Fothergill led the Detroit Tigers to a ten-inning victory over the Senators at Washington, 5 to 2. Bob got three hits, two of them doubles, scored one run and drove in three more.

The Boston Red Sox returned to the league cellar by dropping a nine to two battle to the Chicago White Sox.

The New York Giants tightened their hold on first place in the National League by downing Ray Kremer and the Pirates at Pittsburgh, 5 to 4.

Cardinals Advance

The St. Louis Cardinals advanced into third place by sinking the hapless Phillies again 5 to 4. The Cardinals announced later in the day that Bob O'Farrell, star catcher and manager of the club in 1927, had been traded to the Giants for George Harper, veteran outfielder.

A wild tenth inning saw the Cincinnati Braves beat the Reds at Cincinnati, 7 to 6. With the score tied at three all, the Braves reached Carl Mays for four hits and four runs.

Nastaka, son of John Grier and Ethel D, with races in the green and white silks of Harry P. Sincclair's Bantococ stable, ruled the favorite among the best of America's three-year-old colts and fillies, and was favored generally to win the historic Woodlawn cup, emblematic of the Preakness crown.

The trophy has been held for a year by Harry Whitney of New York, by reason of the victory of his Bostonian last year, and will be presented to the winner of the Maryland jockey club's premier feature today by Gov. Albert C. Ritchie.

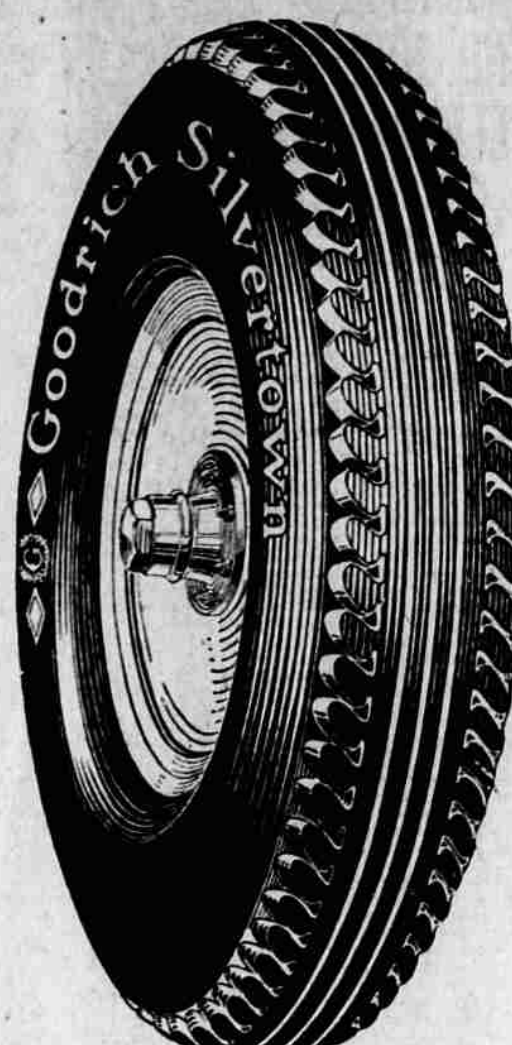

U. S. AND FINNS TIED IN RACES

DeMar and Ray American Hopes for the 1928 Olympic Marathon

Gould (Associated Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK (AP)—For all the shouting there has been about the decadence of American long distance running talent it remains a fact that Uncle Sam's entries have done as well. If not better than those of any other nation in the classic Olympic Marathon.

Finland's two triumphs since the war, by Kohlenmaier in 1920 at Antwerp and Stenroos, the cabinet-maker, in 1924 at Paris, are fresh in mind but over the long stretch of Olympic rivalry America has given a good account of herself and promises to do so again this summer at Amsterdam, with Jole Ray and Clarence DeMar leading the pack.

Finland and America are the only nations to produce more than one Marathon King. The Yankee triumphs of Hicks at St. Louis in 1904 and 19-year-old Johnny Hayes at London in 1908 match the sterling victories of the Finns in the last two Olympiads.

On three other occasions in the games of 1906, 1912 and 1924, the United States finished no worse than third. Three of the first four in 1904 were Yankees. At Stockholm four years later the South Africans, McArthur and Giltsman, finished one-two but Gaston Strobino came in third for America and ten of the first 18 to finish wore the red, white and blue shield on their jerseys. DeMar was twelfth.

These displays of American team strength have never been approached before or since by any other country. Finland did not have a single finisher in 1912 but

landed four of the first ten places in 1920. This year there seems at least an even chance that the most highly prized Olympic victory will go to an American marathoner, with the prospects now favoring either DeMar, 40 years old and a veteran of two previous Olympics, or Ray, the former mile king.

DeMar and Ray, as a result of official Olympic tryout, are the two outstanding contenders. DeMar, like most long distance men, seems to ripen and improve with age. The wily little Melrose runner has inexhaustible stamina, keen racing judgment and experience in his favor. But his ambition to crown a brilliant career with Olympic victory this time, after finishing third in 1924, is no greater than that of Ray.

Joe, too, has been denied the satisfaction of Olympic victory in two previous trips abroad. Where he failed as a middle distance runner he is confident of success over the long grind. Ray's wonderful stride, natural grit and confidence are in his favor.

The history of the Olympic Marathon, rich as it is in color, could have no more dramatic episode than a triumph for the old Kankakee Flier.

Twenty years ago Johnny Hayes made himself a national idol by his Marathon victory, even though it was gained because of the collapse of the Italian, Dorando, who had led Johnny into the stadium by a substantial margin and who would have won had his stamina been enough to carry him over the remaining few hundred yards.

The tragedy in that race over Dorando's downfall had a comic relief in the protest of Hefferon, the South African, who finished second; that Hayes also was helped across the finish. Hefferon was not inside the stadium when Hayes finished and had no basis for such a protest unless he figured it was one way of joining the general argument that the finish aroused.

Hefferon's friends, in extenuation of his failure to win, explained later that the distance was too short for him and that he was not at his best under about 40 miles.

No other Olympic event is so universal in interest or representation as the Marathon. Twenty nations entered runners in the 1924 race. Thirty were represented in 1924 when Finland, Italy, America, Great Britain and Chile figured in the point scoring.

37 Innings Needed To Win Ball Game

CHICAGO (AP)—Extra inning games have been common in the American Association, race this season, but old timers never will forget the time Indianapolis and Minneapolis had to play 37 innings to decide one contest.

It was back in 1913 and the game stood for a play-off for four months.

The first game was played on April 25, ending in a one-all tie in six innings when rain halted the fray. The second attempt was on June 15, when darkness stopped the game at the end of the ninth inning with the score 6 to 6.

On August 7, they tried one more to break the deadlock. This time darkness again interfered, in the thirteenth inning, with the score knotted at two each. The next day, however, the teams succeeded in deciding the game, the Millers batting out an 11 to 1 victory.
