Thrills Galore In Crook Drama At The Star

If you like mystery dramas, you'll go to the Star to see "The Lone Wolf" the Columbia feature picture playing at the Star theater Sunday and Monday. It has all the allure and intrigue that are associated with stealthy figures moving in the dark, menacing shadows, and plotting and counterplotting. The thrills are many.

The major part of the action takes place on an ocean liner. The heroine, Eve De Montalais (Lois Wilson), is smuggling a valuable collection of jewels into the United States. It is her intention to sell them for all she can get. The sum realized is to go toward restitution for a large sum of money that her brother has embezzled.

But alas for the best laid plans, etc. The knowledge that Miss De Montalais has in her possession a king's ransom in jewels is shared by a gang of desperate and unscrupulous thieves, who have taken passage on the same boat in order to fish them from her. Also on board is Michael Lanyard, "The Lone Wolf," (Bert Lytell), who is known as one of the most daring adventurers on the continent.

It would be unfair to reveal all the details of the plot, or the manner in which the tables are turned on the gang and Miss De Montalais' jewels, made safe for smuggling, restored to her. Oh, yes, the gang gets the jewels, but only for a while! A swift-moving romance starts soon after the story opens, and this is brought to a successful close with the final fade-out.

Altogether, "The Lone Wolf" can be set down as a worthwhile screen play.

Bert Lytell, as usual, is excellent in what is by this time a familiar and likeable characterization. Lois Wilson, as the very much-loved heroine, is good to look upon and plays her part with naturalness and restraint. Others in the cast that give more than commendable performances are James Mason, Ned Sparks, Ann Brody and Alphonse Ethier. The photography is excellent throughout. The play was directed by Edward H. Griffith.

"Mother" Showing At Arcade On Sunday

Helen Bennett, who created history with her superb work in "Stella Dallas," has added new laurels with her magnificent performance in "Mother," which will be the special Mother's Day attraction at the Arcade theater Sunday. "Mother" is a simple and wholesome, yet absorbing, story of a woman who sacrifices herself for her family, only to find them growing away from her when prosperity arrives, and Miss Bennett's artistry makes her literally live the part.

Few pictures in recent months have achieved such a powerful effect as does this straightforward but intensely dramatic film. As a study of the results of too much success and too much jazz, it is thoroughly worth while, and with the crowning touch of Miss Bennett's perfect interpretation and the support of a splendid cast, it is a masterpiece.

Much of "Mother's" appeal is due to the remarkable direction of J. Leo Meehan the man who made the notable screen versions of Gene Stratton-Porter's "Laddie," "The Magic Garden" and "Keeper of the Bees." Meehan has an unusual flare for the "humey," nature type of story, such as both Mrs. Porter and the famous novel which suggested

"Mother," wrote, and he has reached great heights in his handling of the story values and the fearless presentation of the theme.

Crawford Kent heads the supporting cast, and gives a superb portrayal of the architect who forgets his wife's share in his success.

William Bakewell, a youngster of immense promise, is splendid as the wayward son, and little Joyce Coad, Mabel Jullienne Scott, Charlotte Stevens and Sam Allen are perfectly cast in their respective roles. Dorothy Yost wrote an excellent adaptation and continuity of the story suggested by the Norris' novel, and Allen Siegler, the cameraman, deserves a word of praise for the marvelous photography.
