Seek Extra Games

Baseball has been very successful in the Blue Mountain circuit so far this spring and for the last week, fans and some clubs have been taking up a cry for extra games. Locally, many feel that the Blue Mountain league, all equipped with at least two pitchers, could play two league games a week, either Saturday and Sunday or else sometime during the middle of the week and Sunday. The only additional expense to the clubs would be transportation. It is declared, and it is believed that extra money taken in by mid-week crowds would be a distinct addition to the clubs' coffers. There would still be plenty of days for exhibition games.

It has been rumored here that after Sunday's game, which will be the fourth in the league, a movement will be made among some of the clubs to change the schedule so that two games a week will be provided for with an 18-game or longer schedule to be drawn up. 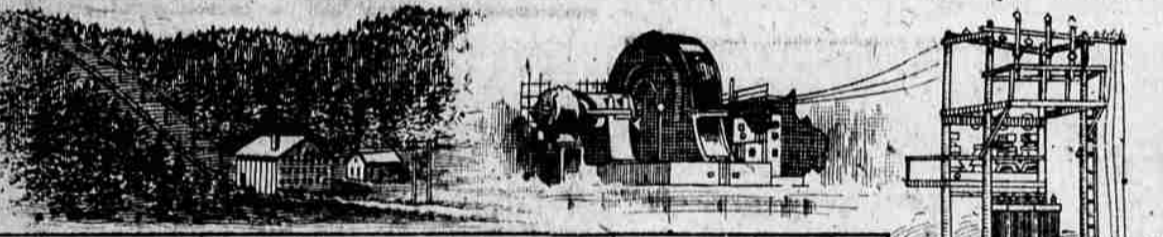

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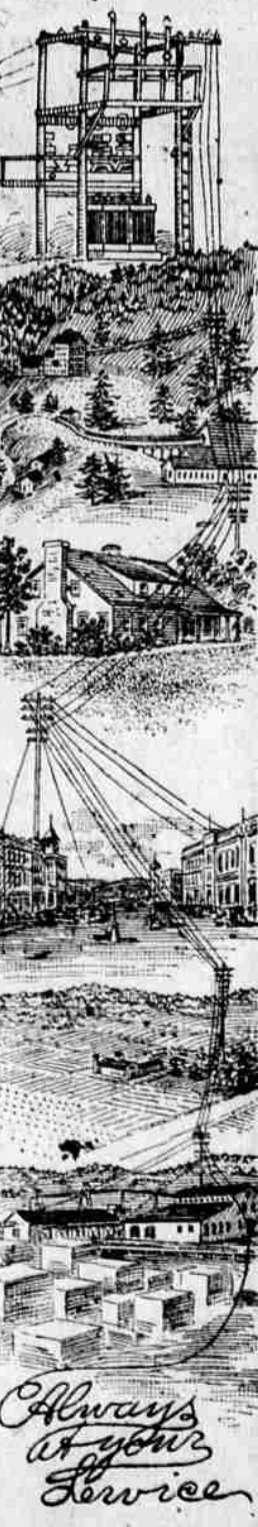
