Mothers To Be Honored Sunday In City Churches

Many Special Services Arranged for Observance of Mother's Day in La Grande.

Tomorrow the world will pay tribute to the mothers—in church, in home and in heart.

Flowers, symbolical of one's love for mother, and by color denoting whether she is with the living or the dead, will be worn by son and daughter alike. Red for the living mother and white for the mothers that have gone.

In the homes special tribute will be paid her—a pause in the usual to lighten her cares for a day or, if she has answered the call, a tearful memory.

And if she happens to be very far away, a telegram will lighten her heart, or a long letter from her son or daughter. Flowers, candy, gifts help to bring her cheer tomorrow, also.

Mother's day has spread tremendously since its first popular observance in 1910, and in 1914, President Wilson issued the first proclamation setting aside the second Sunday in May for the mothers.

In La Grande churches, special services are being held, so arranged to be especially appropriate.

Christian Church

At the Central Church of Christ autos are being furnished for all mothers, grandmothers and great-grandmothers who have no way to come. A telephone call to Dr. J. L. McPherson, or the Rev. R. L. Putnam, pastor, will result in a car for transportation to the church.

Special music, a pageant and a sermon on "Mother" are features of the morning program. A special recognition service with bouquets for awards will also have a place in the program. Sunday school will be held at the usual hour. There will be no evening service because of baccalaureate services at the L. D. S. tabernacle.

Island City Church

The Rev. H. I. Hansen, pastor of the Island City Community church, special services both morning and evening. "The Mother Ideal Creates the Consciousness of Tenderness" will be the sermon at the 11 o'clock hour, following Sunday school at 10 a. m. Mothers and sons are particularly invited to the morning service and will

be seated in the middle rows. In the evening, a father's day service will be featured, with fathers and daughters seated in the middle rows. The subject will be "The Mystery of Being Is With God." Epworth league meets at 7 p. m. There will be special music both morning and evening and all are welcome to attend. Both the choir and orchestra will participate.

First M. E. Church
