HOSPITAL; IS
BADLY HURT

Fracas in Local Restaurant Causes Arrest of Fred Collins, Negro

LOCAL MAN CUT
IN THE ABDOMEN

Chance to Live Depends Upon Whether Infection Sets in—Condition Is Good Today.

Charles "Duke" Kingsley is in the Grande Ronde hospital today dangerously cut in the abdomen and Fred Collins, 20-year-old negro, is held in the county jail on an open charge, the result of a cutting affray in a local restaurant at 1 o'clock this morning.

Kingsley's condition is very critical. It is reported, his chance to live depends upon whether infection sets in. His condition is good at present. There is a five-inch cut across his abdomen, his intestines are exposed in two places, and he was stabbed in the groin, according to Dr. A. L. Richardson.

Collins Confesses
Sheriff Jesse Breshears captured Collins about 5 o'clock this morning in the west end of the railroad yards in a box car. He freely confessed his part in the fracas, the sheriff reported this morning. He will be held on an open charge until further developments.

The night police were called to the restaurant at 1 o'clock this morning, where they found Mr. Kingsley on the floor with his abdomen cut, according to police records.

The police said that Mr. Kingsley escaped that a negro cut him and immediately the man hunt, that terminated four hours later, got under way. Police men Rice and Allen and Deputy Sheriff Klinghammer went to Hillard, Police Chief Clint Haynes went to North Powder, the sheriff first went to Elsie and then returned while other officials were searching in La Grande.

Breshears Finds Negro
Mr. Breshears decided to go through the negro section, but found nothing there and then it occurred to him that the yards would be a good place to search. He started down a string of box cars and then went on the other side. Shortly before he reached one box car, the negro stuck his head out of the door, the sheriff yelled at him and Collins jumped to the ground and held up his hands.

"I guess you're the man I'm looking for," Mr. Breshears said, without any display of weapons, whatever.

"Yes sah, Ise de man," Collins replied.

Later, Mr. Breshears said that Collins told a complete story of his alleged part in the affair.

Tells His Story
According to his confession, he went into the restaurant and ordered a "hamburger" and Mr. Kingsley, Collins declares, struck him twice—once with a stool. Thereupon, Collins reached for his knife and started cutting. When Mr. Kingsley fell to the floor, Collins ran.

Mr. Kingsley was still under ether at the hospital this morning and Mr. Breshears was unable to question him.

Dr. F. L. Rabston, county coroner, has investigated the case but all details are in the sheriff's hands at present.

Collins said that he came here Friday from Huntington, Ore., looking for a job but was unable to find work.

Terrific Hitting Blasts the Way to Fourth Straight Victory—Baker Downs Walla Walla.

The Pirates fought through 11 of the toughest innings they ever played at Pendleton yesterday but managed to nose out the Buckaroos by two runs, due to the timely hitting of Davis, Stokke, Marlow and Silcott.

La Grande was behind or tied all the way until the first of the eleventh, when a desperate rally put the fourth straight win on ice. Helms first up, popped out to second base and Buckner struck out. With two down, it began to look like another extra inning. Then Davis smashed out a solid two-base hit, Stokke, next up, duplicated his feat, scoring Davis and breaking the 3-3 tie. Marlow, who had been hitting terrifically during the game, looked too dangerous to Myers and he was given a walk. Silcott, who hadn't got a safe hit all day, figured the time was ripe and smote the apple for a long single, scoring Stokke and taking the count five to three. LaSalle came up, took a lousy cut at the ball, but the right fielder gathered it in, retiring the side.

Buckner Saves Day
Buckner had the Buckaroos on his hip in the last of the eleventh. Olson grounded to Helms, Adams fouled out to Spellman and Clark, sent in as a last hope, singled. Myers, who pitched a nice game, couldn't see Ducks' slants and whiffed.

Phil Henion, new Pirate pitcher, started the game and after a poor first inning that allowed one score, settled down and blanked the Pendleton crew until the eighth inning. La Grande evened up the score in the seventh on singles by Helms and Davis. Walters, his first baseman, drove out a two-base hit. OVER SUNDAY
IN ACCIDENTS

Baby Is Sole Surviving Member of Erie, Pa., Family of Seven

TWO CARS CRASH;
DEATH TOLL HIGH

ERIE, Pa., May 14 (AP)—A baby is the sole surviving member of a family of seven and a father and son of another family also are dead as the result of two automobiles crashing into a Pennsylvania railroad train at Espyville, near here. Five others were injured, one perhaps fatally.

The tragedy occurred yesterday and is said to have been a result of a race between the two automobiles.

The dead: Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Hays, of Shenango and their four sons, 16, 7, 4 and 3 years; Ward Thomas, 66, of Pennsylvania and his son, William, 32, of Allston.

The injured are: Mrs. Ward Thomas who suffered a fractured skull and is not expected to survive at an Erie hospital; the two-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hays, William Thompson and her two children.
