Bridge Pointers

When a Dealer has bid No Trump, the next player may find himself with sufficient strength in one suit, or divided between two, to warrant the expectation of making game if the No Trump bid played; or of making his contract if he bid two of his best suits. Under such conditions he should not bid unless convinced that his bid will not guide the other side out of their No Trump into a suit declaration with which they will score game. Even when his best suit is a Major and he has such strength in the other Major that he does not fear that the adversaries will shift to it, a bid is not wise unless the hand should be so strong that with the help his partner may reasonably be expected to furnish, there is a good chance to make game against an adverse No Trump holding.

Therefore Second Hand should pass with a solid suit, unless it be of enormous length or supported by sufficient side strength to make game probable; and similarly he should pass with a five-card or six-card King-Queen-Jack suit and one quick 7-8-entry.

On the other hand in these days of light No Trumps, it is not impossible that Second Hand has a suit of such length and strength that a bid, especially if it be a Major, may mean game if partner can take a couple of tricks. So when a probability of game looms up, Second Hand should bid, or perhaps double, informatively; there are many hands which have strength enough for a bid, but not enough for a double, and others which have strength enough for a double but not length enough for a bid. Therefore, whether to bid, double or pass is a question for which it is difficult to furnish any general answer. It must be left largely to the judgment of the player who, in reaching his determination, should realize that ten mistakes are made by bidding a suit Second Hand over a No Trump to every one that is made by passing; and that doubles should not be made unless the doubling hand contains at least five high cards that probably will take tricks.

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BEFORE MEAT

Any preferred sort of fish can be served for dinner but heering was chosen since it can be broiled and when small children must be provided for a boneless fish is desirable.

Orange Salad.

One cup sliced orange, 1 cup sliced celery, 1 cup pecan nuts, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/2 cup whipping cream, 1 canned pineapple.

The orange should be free from all white skin. Use only tender center blades of celery and crisp in ice water. Chill until needed.

Combine fruit, celery and nuts. Arrange on inside leaves of lettuce and dress with mayonnaise combined with cream, whipped until firm. Garnish with pineapple cut in "threads" and serve at once.
