Recent parts of his talk, police heard together the information that he is a stunt flier and parachute exhibitionist, who went to an aviation school at Roseville a few days ago for instructions.

Another theory held from letters found in Frechett's clothing police thought the purpose of the trip might have been a bizarre and premeditated plan of self destruction, the episode of which was to have been over the home town of his sweetheart.

One of the letters, addressed to a Miss Georgia Pappas of Portland, couched in endearments, concluded as follows:

"Death is my message, sweet heart."

Another addressed to Frechett's mother, said he feared that "death" approached.

Chang to Defend Shangkaiwan Port

SHANGHAI, May 15 (AP).—The nationalist news agency today said that Marshal Chang Tiao-lin, northern dictator, had left Peking in an armored train, arriving at Tientsin on Sunday.

The same source stated that the northern forces were preparing defense works at Shangkaiwan, at the sea coast end of the great wall.

Two Aged Sisters Found Murdered

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 15 (AP).—The bodies of two aged sisters beaten to death as they lay in bed were discovered today at their cottage home on Maple street. A trunk had been pried open and officers advanced the theory that robbery had the motive of the killing of Mrs. Belle Holmes, 79, and Miss Kate Sutterwhite, 72.

Dr. Roy L. Carter, coroner, said the condition of the bodies indicated the two women were slain Sunday night.

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Profit Taking Turns Tendency of Stocks Down

NEW YORK, May 15 (AP).—Heavy profit-taking in many of the standard industrials and railroad shares turned the course of profits irregular in today's stock market after an early outburst of strength in the airplane, copper and motor shares. Early gains of 1 to 11 points were materially reduced in the late realising movement. Although new leaders were quickly brought forward by operators working for higher prices.

The volume of business again taxed the facilities of the exchange, the ticker falling 45 minutes behind the market of early afternoon. The closing was irregular. Losses became more widely distributed in late dealing as realising or about selling increased. The "bulls," however, maintained a good grip on many stocks and further heavy accumulation of Studebaker carried it above 75. Curtiss Aero and Wright Aero were quoted 6 and 8 points, respectively, below their early peak prices. Total sales approximately were 4,100,000 shares.
