Van Winkle Answers County Questions

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day for each day employed in the transaction of county business, that is, when looking after repairs to roads and bridges as well as attending the session of the county court, and should be allowed the same per diem for looking after roads and bridges when it is mutually agreed by the county court that the supervision on certain roads and bridges by the commissioners is needed, and the different commissioners being designated to look after this sort of work in certain sections of the county.

Here, Attorney Van Winkle refers to several provisions, saying, "Where mileage is allowed for traveling expenses, it is deemed to be allowed as a compensation for the time so spent in traveling." He concludes: "It is my opinion that county commissioners are not entitled to draw the mileage fees prescribed by section 2676, Oregon Laws, but shall, instead, receive only the per diem compensation provided for by section 2625."

Among the several other questions was this: "Is it legal for the county treasurer to do work in offices other than the treasurer's office and work other than that connected with the treasurer's office and draw pay from the county for such work, other than the salary allowed by law, this extra work being done in the sheriff's office and during office hours?"

This is answered by reference to a number of provisions with this statement, "Such being the case it is my opinion that the county treasurer may receive pay for services which he may render outside of and in addition to his ordinary official duties when the same are not in conflict with or are not incompatible with those to be performed by him as county treasurer."
