MENUS

By Sister Mary
Breakfast— Stewed figs, cereals, cream, pineapple omelet, rice, nutmeg, milk, coffee.
Luncheon— Stuffed baked potatoes, creamed carrots, bean bread, cottage pudding with strawberry sauce, milk tea.
Dinner— Casserole of mutton, boiled new potatoes, sliced turnips in cream sauce, rhubarb, short milk, coffee.
Cottage Pudding— Three tablespoons butter, 1/4 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1/2 cup hot water, 1/4 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon vanilla, 1/4 teaspoon salt.
 Cream butter and gradually beat in sugar. Add egg well beaten. Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt and add to first mixture. Add hot water and beat until batter is perfectly smooth. Add vanilla and pour into oiled and floured shallow pan. Bake 25 minutes in a moderately hot oven. Cut in squares and serve warm with the following sauce:
Strawberry Sauce— Four tablespoons butter, 1/4 cup powdered sugar, 1/4 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup crushed strawberries, 1 cup whipping cream.
 Cream butter and gradually beat in sugar which has been sifted. Beat until creamy. Beat in vanilla and strawberries. Fold in cream whipped until firm and serve at once.
 This is another excellent way to use strawberries before they become plentiful.

Sunday's sister, was one of the chief witnesses for the state yesterday and told substantially the same story as that told by Goldie and Thomas Tuesday. He said it was the intention of himself and Ferdinand to frighten the occupants of the garage when they fired the shots into the building and thus caused them to come out. After they had shot several times, he said, Goldie came out and started for the house. Before she had gone far a shot came from the garage. Ferdinand was hit in the body and died shortly afterward.

The defense is trying to show that Hopkin's horse also was shot during the fracas and that the saddle and blanket with blood stains and bullet hole were identified by witnesses and offered as exhibits.

THE GARDEN

PLANTS FOR WINTER BOUQUETS

Plants for winter bouquets have achieved unusual importance during the last few seasons due to the popularity of dried flowers for indoor decoration. It is a very easy matter to raise an ample supply on a small space in the garden. There are a number of plants, all annuals, which grow as easily as petunias or asters which produce flowers that are dry when they open their blooms. They are commonly known as star flowers or everlasting.

The best liked of these is the original straw flower or helichrysum, which gives fine double flowers with yellow centers ranging from pure white through light and deep yellow to rich scarlets and crimsons. The rhodanthus with silvery pink graceful flowers is another favorite. The globe anemone gives clove-headed shaped blooms in rich purple.

They make as fine a display in the garden as they do in dried bouquets. Their culture is the same as the average annual, rich soil, sun and a supply of moisture in dry periods. They come into bloom from seed soon May 1 about the beginning of August and from then are a mass of bloom.

For winter baskets or vases, cut the flowers when half open, hang them head down in a dark dry place until well cured and they are ready for use. The annual statice in lavender, yellow, rose and white are also much used for winter bouquets.

Give all these everlasting plenty of room for good crops of flowers. The helichrysums, the most robust growing, reaching a height of 24 inches, should be spaced a foot apart. The more slender growing rhodanthus needs only six inches. The globe anemone and statice each need a foot of room in which to develop.

The misty bloom of the perennial anemone is much used. Plants of this must be secured. The double forms are best but they do not come reliably true from seed, only a small percentage giving double bloom. All of these may be planted in the open ground as soon as the soil is in condition to work and will give fine bloom by midsummer.
