PRICE MOVEMENT BEWILDERING ONE

Sensational Rally in Stock Exchange Brings Dra- matic Close

NEW YORK, May 17 (AP)—A sensational rally in prices brought to a dramatic close a day of bewildering price movements on the New York stock exchange today. Prices dropped \$1 to \$6.50 a share at the opening, failed to rise before mid-day, lost a good part of their gains in an early afternoon reaction inspired by stiffening money rates and then soared again in spectacular fashion in the last hour of trading. Final quotations disclosed a rather imposing list of net gains ranging from \$1 to \$12, interrupted with a number of not declines.

American Telephone and Tele-
graph common was the outstanding
individual feature in today's mar-
ket, soaring nearly 15 points to a
new high record at 211 on buying
influenced by the proposed in-
crease in capitalization with the or-
dering of valuable weights to share
holders.

Supporting orders turned the
current of prices strongly upward
again before the close, after the
avalanche of selling had driven a
number of important shares to the
lowest prices of the week. Curtiss
rebounded from 148 1/2 up to 160.

Wright came up from 212 1/2 to
above 220. American International
sold more than 8 points beyond its
previous close when it touched
119 1/2, duplicating the year's best
figure. Ludlum Steel was up nearly
3 points at 67, also a new peak.
General Motors and Radio rallied
3 and 5 points, respectively, from
their low levels. Total sales ap-
proximated 3,400,000 shares.

Wheat Continues To Slump; Close Heavy in Chicago

CHICAGO, May 17 (AP)—Start-
ing at 5c to 2 1/4c off, wheat later
underwent a material further drop.
Corn and oats were also weak, with
corn opening 3/4 to 1/2c down and
subsequently showing decided fur-
ther losses. Provisions were con-
siderably closed heavy, 2 1/4 to 4 1/2c
net lower, corn at 3/4 to 1 1/2c ad-
vance, oats 3/4 to 1 1/2c off and pro-
visions 2 to 2 1/2c up.

Produce Market Quiet; Berries Moving Freely

PORTLAND, Ore., May 17 (AP)—
Portland wholesale produce mar-
kets were rather quiet today with
prices generally steady. Strawber-
ries continued to move freely at
fancy figures for locals. Supplies
were nominal as the cooler weath-
er of the last two days has not rip-
ened as many berries as during the
previous warm spell. Reports from
growing districts, however, point
to an earlier season on berries than
was expected. In several regions
it is reported that the yields will
be light.

Green peas were on the market
and met with excellent demand on
account of the fine quality. They
were selling at 12c per pound.
