

AMERICANS OUT
OF BRITISH PLAYSole Survivor in Woman's
Tournament Eliminated
by Miss Fowler

HUNSTANTON, England, May 17 (AP)—America's sole surviving representative in the British women's open golf tournament, Mrs. Dorothy Campbell Hurd, was eliminated today 3 and 2 by Miss Judith Fowler today.

Mrs. Hurd survived yesterday's stormy weather only to be defeated under much more favorable golfing conditions today. She seemed to play wearily from the start, but nevertheless played her long shots well all the way around. It was her putting, together with several brilliant shots by Miss Fowler that put her out of the championship race.

The semi-finalist this afternoon were the French girls, Mlle. Manette le Blau against Enie M. Wilson and Miss Fowler against S. Marshall.

Miss Wragg Eliminated
Miss Mabel Wragg, who conquered Glenna Collett, the American star, in yesterday's play was eliminated today 5 and 3 by Miss Marshall. The American girls in the tournament are asking what Yorkshire has against the United States as Miss Fowler, like Miss Wragg, is from that country.

After the first hole today Mrs. Hurd had a string of ill luck and was bunkered twice on the second hole while after one slip on the fourth green Miss Fowler's putter never failed her. Mrs. Hurd played the eighth and ninth excellently, taking both holes, but she slipped on the tenth and fourteenth. Mrs. Hurd had made a brave effort to square the match at the ninth, but then Miss Fowler unleashed a birdie at the tenth, captured the fourteenth when Mrs. Hurd barely missed a 12 footer, and then sealed the defeat of the American on the sixteenth by getting another birdie 2. It was at this same hole that Miss Collette went down to defeat yesterday.

MARLOW GOES TO
TOP IN HITTINGGib Stokke, His Team
Mate, Second—La Salle
Now in Third Place

Some pitchers had their day last Sunday and some didn't—and as a result a new batting king is crowned in Blue Mountain league baseball hitting percentages—"Home Run" Marlow, of La Grande.

His team mate, Tony LaSalle, who has led the league in hitting since the season opened, slumped down several notches. Marlow, who has two circuit smashes to his record, and who would have four if Pendleton ground rules were different, clouted the apple to the tune of 7.50 in Sunday's game, bringing his percentage up to an even .500 for league contests.

And, hot on Marlow's heels, is Gib Stokke, who now has the respectable percentage of .397. He, too, hit .750 Sunday and his three safeties were all for two bases.

Two Good Pinch Hitters
Among the pinch hitters, King, of Pendleton, reigned supreme with a standing of .600. Working in two games he has three hits out of five times at bat. For one game pinch hitting, Clark, of Pendleton, is just about perfect. In one trip up this season he connected with a safe hit.

In team hitting and fielding La Grande still has the lead, but it isn't quite as wide a margin as before—due to Baker's exceptional work with the willow and in the field against Walla Walla. Baker climbed to second place in fielding and maintained second place in hitting, gaining 31 points on La Grande in the latter.

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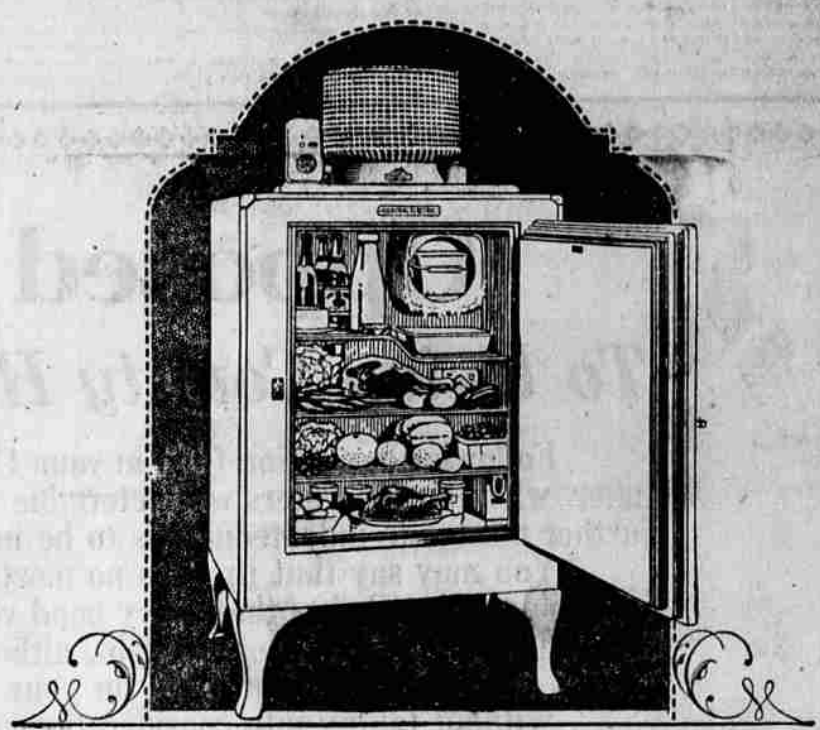
