60 PER CENT VOTE LOOKED FOR IN CITY

Two Hundred and Twenty Ballots Marked in 7 Precincts by 1 P. M.

VOTING MACHINES USED IN PORTLAND

Fair Weather Is General over State—The Observer to Issue An Election Extra Tonight.

Voting is quiet in La Grande today, with 220 ballots marked in seven of the city's 13 precincts before 1 o'clock this afternoon. This represents about 12 per cent of the registered voters in those precincts and leads political observers to forecast about a 60 per cent vote here before the polls close at 8 o'clock tonight.

Of the total of 220, the majority are republicans, with 53 democrats casting their votes. At the court house the count was 10 republicans and nine democrats while at precinct No. 6 the vote was about divided. The other five precincts showed more than two republicans to one democrat voting.

City, County Offices Closed

City and county offices are closed today, the occasion being observed as a judicial holiday in Oregon.

The Observer will begin tabulating returns as soon as the counting starts this evening and shortly before midnight an election extra will be put on the streets, giving the trend of the election. Further and more complete returns will be available early tomorrow morning. Extras will not be delivered to subscribers but will be sold on the streets and in some of the residential districts, at five cents a copy.

All Oregon Voting

PORTLAND, Ore., May 18 (AP)—Citizens of Oregon were exercising their franchise today over the heaviest primary election ballot since the last presidential election in 1924.

Pavored by fair weather voting was expected to be heavy. Early balloting in most Portland precincts was light. There was some delay in precincts where voting machines were used today for the first time.

Total registration in the 1842 precincts in the state was 317,491, of which 222,132 registered as republicans and 95,359 as democrats.

Herbert Hoover was the sole candidate in republican ticket for republican nomination for president. All the republican candidates seeking to be delegates to the national convention were pledged to Hoover except one who had declared for Lowden and one who favored a government liquor control declaration by the republican party.

Business Men Give Support To Convention

A report stating that business men of La Grande are giving their hearty approval to plans for the state labor convention here in the middle of October was made during a short meeting of the Central labor council at the city hall last night. Everett Rosenbaum presided in the absence of both the president, Max Tulien, and the vice president, H. H. Ostlund, who are ill.

No definite arrangements for the convention program will be made until after July first when new officers will take their positions and begin active preparations. It was decided last night. General plans for the state event are progressing very satisfactorily, however. Hourly business was transacted.

HOPKINS IS HELD GUILTY OF SLAYING

Murder Verdict at Enterprize Accompanied by Recommendation

JURORS DESIRE LIFE IN PRISON

Four Hours Deliberation Needed to Determine Course—to Pass Sentence on Monday.

ENTERPRISE, Ore., May 18.—Bert Hopkins, who has been on trial in the circuit court here this week charged with murder in the first degree for the killing of Ferdinand Sunday last December, was found guilty as charged by the jury after four hours' deliberation here yesterday.

A recommendation for life imprisonment accompanied the verdict, and Judge Poe announced that sentence would be pronounced Monday morning at 9 o'clock. The case was given to the jury yesterday morning shortly before 11 o'clock.

Hopkins shot and killed Ferdinand Sunday on the night of December 28, 1927, at the Sunday home near Flora, 40 miles north of this town, in an altercation involving Sunday's 17-year-old sister, Goldie. Hopkins is about 45 years of age and has been involved in several other shooting scrapes.

Food Ordinance Takes Effect In City Saturday

La Grande's new food and drink ordinance, which was passed a month ago, becomes effective tomorrow, according to City Recorder J. E. Stearns. Actual observance of the new ordinance, however, is not expected to get under way until Monday. City Manager W. C. Crows states. An inspector, well qualified for the position, is now being secured, he says.

The new ordinance provides that all retailers of milk, meats, food and drinks in general, be licensed and pay a certain fee. Licenses will not be granted until each place, whether it be a store or a dairy, has been inspected and approved by the city inspector. Licenses fees vary for dairy herds, depending upon the number of cows, and a \$6 fee is required of business places, etc. Retailing milk, foods, meats, etc. Creameries pay a higher license fee. All fees are good for a year, unless further inspection should result in a discontinuance.

City Manager Crows said today that the state dairy and food commission has promised its co-operation and aid in starting the ordinance in La Grande and expects members of the commission's force to be here over the weekend for the work.

Sandino Threats Reach U. S. Marines

MANAGUA, May 18 (AP)—Faced with a direct rebel threat against "all that is North American" American marines were pushing their way through the northern jungles of Nicaragua today in pursuit of a rebel force that killed one marine and wounded two others in a fight northwest of Jinotega.

The threat was issued over the signature of Augustino Sandino, rebel chieftain and was found at La Laguna by H. W. Amphlett, manager of the mine who returned there after the place had been captured and destroyed by rebel forces several weeks ago. Mr. Amphlett, a British subject, reached Puerto Cabezas last night.

THREE DEATHS IN SOUTHERN STORM

Texas, Oklahoma Property Damage Estimated at \$1,000,000

DALLAS, Tex., May 18 (AP)—Reports of three deaths, a number of persons seriously injured, and property damage amounting to probably a million dollars filtered in slowly today from scattered sections of North Texas and Southern Oklahoma that have been swept by a general wind, rain and hail storm.

Bruce Coleman was killed when struck by lightning during a heavy rain and electrical storm at Post, Tex. J. C. Brinlee was fatally injured in the collapse of a dance hall near Drumwright, Okla., and Carl Toach lost his life when his automobile skidded on wet pavement and overturned at Oilton, Okla.

Thackerville, Okla., with a population of about 300, was struck by a tornado last night, and early reports were that nearly every house there was blown from foundations. Large oil storage tanks at Midland and Burke Burnett, Tex., were ignited by lightning and loss was estimated at several hundred thousand dollars.

Railroad tracks were washed out in places and telegraph and telephone wires were down in several instances isolating small communities.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 18 (AP)—Frank Nichols, 72, druggist owner, was killed last night when hit by an automobile at a street intersection. John Walters, driver, was held under \$500 bail on a charge of involuntary manslaughter.

ASTORIA, Ore., May 18 (AP)—Bernard Erickson, 4, was fatally injured late yesterday when hit by an automobile when he jumped from behind a parked automobile.

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 18 (AP)—Mrs. Lillian Noonan, 36, wife of D. T. Noonan of Vancouver, Wash., and mother of five minor children, was killed last night when, according to police, an automobile driven by Mrs. Kate Simco of Vancouver, turned into an alleyway from the street, striking Mrs. Noonan, who was walking along the sidewalk.

Italia Returns To Kings Bay; To Go North Again

KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, May 18 (AP)—The dirigible Italia returned to her base here at 9:15 a. m. today from an exploring trip to Lenin land. The weather was fine.

The dirigible has been in flight for almost 68 hours over a course of some 2,000 miles, having left Kings Bay at 1:20 p. m. Tuesday. General Noble sailed over Lenin land for four hours. The view was so forbidding, however, that he abandoned his plan to land men on the unexplored region to make various scientific investigations. Conditions were found unsuitable for explorations since the most favorable time passed with the first half of May.

After flying over Lenin land, the dirigible turned and headed its blunt nose toward Kings Bay. The next trip of the Italia, it was announced, will be to the North Pole. This will start in about five days. Meanwhile, the dirigible will be given a thorough overhauling, as it is hoped to make this the most important venture of the expedition.

City Marshal Is Given Auto Ride

HOOD RIVER, Ore., May 18 (AP)—With a gun poked in his side as he stood on the running board of an automobile, City Marshal Manley, of White Salmon, Wash., was carried a mile and a half today by three young men he sought to arrest on suspicion of attempting to pass a worthless check.

Manley jumped off the car near Hingen, and tried at the fleeing car, puncturing one of the tires. The fugitives ran about a mile before abandoning the car. Later Marshal Monroe captured a youth said to have been in the car. He refused to give his name. Officers were out looking for the others.

LEWIS IS NOT EAGER TO RUN WITH AL SMITH

CHICAGO, May 18 (AP)—Former Senator James Hamilton Lewis is not seeking the democratic nomination for vice president, he said today in commenting on a conference Lusia J. Malin said he held with Governor Smith of New York with a view to making Lewis the running mate of the democratic presidential candidate.

Judge Malin, Lewis said, is a personal friend and was recommended by the former senator for the judicial post.

"Judge Malin," said Mr. Lewis, "has always wanted to do something for me and apparently has taken action without consulting me."

"I have talked with no one about my candidacy for anything and am not a candidate for office," Lewis was surprised to hear that anyone was exerting efforts in his behalf, and am sorry that the step was taken."

FARM RELIEF BILL'S FATE IN BALANCE

Measure Placed in Coolidge's Hand with Merchant Marine Bill

PRESIDENT HAS 10 DAYS TO ACT

Senator McNary Confers with Chief Executive and Will See Him Again on Monday.

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—As asked by republican independent in the senate, the McNary-Haugen farm relief and the Jones-White merchant marine bill today reached President Coolidge in the same envelope.

Predicting a veto of the farm bill, Senator Norris, republican of Nebraska, a supporter of that measure asked in the senate that Mr. Coolidge also veto the merchant marine measure. He described the shipping bill which would provide extensive replacement of the merchant marine as a "subsidy" proposition because of provision for liberal ocean mail contracts to private shippers.

"President Coolidge has ten days in which to sign or veto the legislation."

McNary Visits Coolidge

Senator McNary, of Oregon, conferred at length with the president today regarding the bill. He, in conjunction with Representative Haugen, of Iowa, led the farm forces in congress to victory. The Oregon senator after the White House conference limited himself to saying that "Mr. Coolidge is still thinking it over."

"I feel that he has not yet made up his mind. I will come back and talk some more with him next Monday," he said.

SUPPLY BILL REPORTED

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—Carrying a total of \$39,332,906 of which \$2,353,747 is in most "extraordinary expenses" in connection with the marine corps expedition in Nicaragua and China, the second deficiency appropriation bill of the present congress today was reported to the house by its appropriations committee.

VETO EXERCISED

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—President Coolidge today vetoed a bill to appropriate \$3,500,000 for roads on the public domain and on Indian reservations. Immediately after the veto Coolidge was read the senate, Nevada, author of the bill, announced he would ask the senate to override the veto.

FENN BILL RETURNED

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—By a vote of 186 to 156, the house today sent the Fenn bill to reapportion the 435 house members up on the basis of the forthcoming 1920 census back to its census committee. The move is construed to preclude the possibility of enactment of any reapportionment legislation this session.

CHANEY FREED BY JURORS IN MEDFORD, ORE.

MEDFORD, Ore., May 18 (AP)—Newton C. Chaney, district attorney of Jackson county, charged with larceny of public money, contained in the prohibition enforcement fund, was acquitted by a jury in the circuit court last night, after 29 minutes deliberation.

Before the jury returned to the court room, Judge Skipworth of Eugene, presiding warned the spectators against any demonstrations. When the verdict was read there were cheers and hand clapping, which the court quickly suppressed.

The trial started Monday, and was interrupted with the primary election, Chaney being a candidate for re-election.

ROSEBURG, May 18 (AP)—The state convention of the Oregon federation of business and professional women's clubs is scheduled to open here this afternoon at 3 o'clock.
