Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE Minor Take-Outs of Partner's One No Trump by Bid of Three

It being understood that a Minor bid of two over partner's one No Trump shows great strength in the Minor, at least five cards in the suit (unless it be made with Ace-King-Queen) and also a lack of No Trump assistance in any other suit.

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THE GARDEN

THE TALL GROWING PEAS For many years the dwarf peas, grown without any support, have practically driven the tall or bush peas out of the home garden.

The support should be given when the peas are planted so that they may start their upward career at once. They should be given rich soil and should be liberally fertilized.

While the dwarf peas are indispensable for the earliest crop, for the mid-season and late crops the bush types are most satisfactory. Their chief advantage is a much heavier yield with as fine quality as the dwarf varieties furnish.

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When a player takes out by bidding three of a Minor, he shows a suit of six cards or more headed by at least Ace-King-Queen, or a hand with greater Minor power.

Furthermore, unlike the two-bid, he does not disclose strength in other suits. The No Trump player knows that the taker-out may have a Minor suit consisting exactly of Ace-King-Queen-x-x-x and no side strength; but there is more than a possibility of further help and, as a matter of experience, there are few No Trumpers taken out by a Minor three-bid that do not go to the game-bid of three No Trumps or five of the Minor, and that is the object of the bid. It is safer than three No Trumps because it gives an option, which is always an advantage. It cannot be said that it absolutely forces the No Trumpster to bid for game, but that is its effect in practically every case.

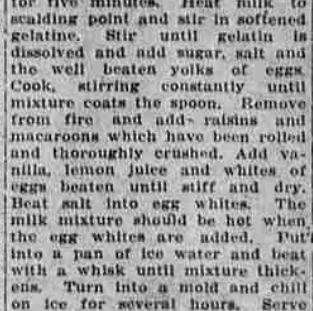
Veal Salad
