Farm Pointers

Hogs kept in the feed lot with cattle which are being fattened help to make the enterprise profitable, especially where large quantities of grain are used in the ration. Cattle in pork are largest when whole grains are used, but such seeds as milo, kafir and barley should be ground. It is well to have at least one shote to every two steers.

Spot of the soils of the east, south and parts of the central west are deficient in lime and will

respond with increased yields to its application. Lime stimulates the proper decomposition of the organic matter in the soil, neutralizes acids, improves the physical condition of heavy soils and supplies directly or indirectly elements needed by growing plants.

Although the time for sowing soybeans depends somewhat on the altitude and the use to be made of the crop, in general the period extends from early spring until midsummers. If they are to be used as a grain or hay crop, seeding should be done about corn planting time, or when the ground has become thoroughly warm, since they germinate and grow poorly in soil that is cold or too wet or dry.
