Colonial Reopens On Saturday

How a quartette of three men and a beautiful girl extricated themselves from the toils of an unscrupulous underworld character is the theme of the "Tiffany production," "Cheaters," which will be one of the features at the Colonial theater Saturday only.

Hein Ferguson as the girl, and Pat O'Malley as the clerk, are both excellent in their characterizations and Lawford Davidson, as the villainous leader above reproach, George Markthorne, for the part he plays, is excellent and Alphonso Eclair, as the detective in true to type. Others who helped round out an excellent night's entertainment were Heinie Conklin as the porter, Helen Lynch as the young society bud, Claire McDowell as the mother and Max Davidson as a comic character.

In Dick Talmadge's latest FBO release, "Doubling with Danger," he strikes a new note with a combination spy and mystery story that is exciting and thrilling to a degree. The picture which will also be a part of the Colonial theater program Saturday, deals with the efforts of Talmadge in preventing the theft of an enormously valuable set of plans by a group of foreign spies, and the hero does some of his famous and dangerous athletic feats that are sure to please the audience. An excellent cast, including Eva Grey, Herbert Prior, Joseph Harrington, Harry Dunkinson and Paul Dumes, all do their part in furnishing the support.

There are many features which can not be overlooked in reviewing Richard Dix' new farce comedy, "Easy Come, Easy Go," but chiefly the picture is remarkable for its entertainment value. Judging from the laughter of the audience at the Arcade theater last night, when the picture opened a three-day run, "Easy Come, Easy Go" has a wide humorous appeal and is easily one of the best, if not the best, of Richard Dix' pictures.

It's humor, as in so many of the Dix farce comedies, is based entirely on the sympathy theme. It portrays the struggles of a clean-cut young American, thoroughly honest and capable, but unfortunately, and his embarrassing experience with a wily, but good-natured crook, who gets him into a tight deal of frothing money, which his own ingenuity, alone, extricates him.

"Easy Come, Easy Go" is certainly the type of story which Dix does best. It is straightforward, simply told and unstrained. There is no straining for effect but the action unfolds in increasingly funny sequences with the necessary dashes of romance to enhance the humor theme.

Nancy Carroll, Dix' new leading woman, who made an outstanding success in the Paramount picture of Anne Nichols' "Abie's Irish Rose," adds new laurels to her crown by her work in "Easy Come, Easy Go." She gives every evidence of becoming one of Paramount's favored stars.

A strong supporting cast works with Dix in this comedy and produces, altogether, an able picture and a really entertaining entertainment. It is a clean, wholesome, sympathy-winning picture, entirely enjoyable.
