Medical Profession Asked to Help Avert Shortage of Rural Doctors

WASHINGTON (AP)—A shortage of country doctors which farm leaders say threatens a general breakdown in rural health services has prompted the medical association to take steps to increase the number of general practitioners whose outlay in time and money in securing their medical education will be such that their services will be within the reach of the rank and file of the people.

Officers of the Grange, in a petition to the association, say: "The family doctor is rapidly becoming extinct. He is being supplanted by the specialist to a degree not warranted under present conditions. If the supply of country doctors is to be replenished, these doctors must come from among the young men and women of the country districts, as was the case in former times. And only in rare instances can the son of a farmer hope to enter the medical profession owing to the expense of his education."

Doctors of the Grange insist they are not advocating any lowering of medical standards. They contend, that more practical education, costing less in time and money, is required.

The National Grange has appointed to the medical association to take steps to increase the number of general practitioners whose outlay in time and money in securing their medical education will be such that their services will be within the reach of the rank and file of the people.

In 1908 there were approximately 23,000 physicians in communities of 1,000 population or less in the United States. A survey made in 1924 showed this number reduced to 27,000. More recent investigations reveal that almost one-third of the towns of 1,000 or less which had physicians in 1914 had none in 1924.

The average age of rural doctors in 1925 was 52 years. Since the average age at death of American physicians is 62, the present generation of country doctors will practically have disappeared in another ten years, it is asserted. Only a small percentage of the doctors graduated in the last ten years have taken up practice in rural districts.

MOSCOW, May 19 (AP)—The body of William D. Haywood will be cremated tonight to carry out the terms of his will by which half of his ashes to be sent to Chicago. He directed that they were to be buried near the graves of the radicals who were executed for participation in the Hay market riot of 1886. Primary Voting Interest Fairly Keen in County

Voting was fairly heavy over the county as a whole in yesterday's primary election. An estimate this morning, based on the vote on the road bond issue in all but about 10 of the 77 precincts and a few by actual count, indicates that more than 2200 voters went to the polls. Actual figures at the time of the official canvass may bring up the total.

Some precincts reported a vote that was lighter than he usually cast in primary elections, which cannot be accurately compared because of the difference in the two types of contests.

The number of registered republicans in Union county is 4088 and there are 2396 democrats in the county who are eligible to vote. Socialists, prohibitionists, independents and miscellaneous are not allowed to vote on the republican and democratic tickets, of course, which means that there were 6494 who can vote on the primary tickets.

The vote was also considered large because of the excellent weather conditions which, it is said, kept many at work who would otherwise have visited the precinct polling places.

Walter M. Pierce ran well on both the democratic and republican ticket in this county. His nomination for the former was assured before the primaries, but in Union county he polled 244 republican votes. Butler was second with 149, Boyd third with 135. Others were: Hinner 76, Nelson 34, Bean 14, Palmer 13, Wiley 0.

Big Kidnole Vote

On the republican lists, the following seven candidates for the republican convention were favored locally in latest returns: Kilde 1197, Koser 1060, Pennington 637, Cook 643, Thompson 609 and Schaupp 573.

For delegates to the convention from this district, two to be elected, F. S. Ivanhoe, of La Grande, led with 988 and Temple was second with 737. Mahaffey polled 671 votes.

Smith in Lead Here

Al Smith took Union county as well as the rest of the state. The latest vote tabulated follows: Smith 252, Walsh 171, Reed 109, Workman 14.

For electors of president and vice president, five to be elected, the following five were leading here: Miller 316, Donahue 291, Hackney 268, Honeyman 220 and Comte 242.

For delegates to the democratic convention from this district, two to be elected, Burns was leading with 229, Hill was second with 194 and Combs third with 130.

In the contest for four delegates at large to the democratic conven-

tion, Union county voted highest on the following: Haney 208, Sheehan 222, Curry 191 and Starkweather 173.

Race is Close

The contest for the democratic nomination for county treasurer remains very close and is not likely to be definitely decided until the official count is made. Adah McCrary has 187 and Celia W. Gates 164. Both are of La Grande.

On both tickets, in every case, unopposed candidates whose names were on the ballot, received the nomination. Sheriff Jesse Hirsch was leading many other lone candidates in number of votes polled.

The voting here was a little better than usual for primary elections, probably due, it is said, to interest in some of the contests.

Voting Machines Slow in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., May 19 (AP)—Voting machines used in 75 precincts in Portland Friday for the first time caused great delay in voting. When closing time came at 8 o'clock there were long lines of men and women at many of the polling places and booths were kept open until all had voted. The last precinct was not closed until 10:30 p. m.

The length of the ballots and unfamiliarity of voters was the cause of the delay.
