BERRY SUPPLIES
UP; DEMAND WEAKPrices Decidedly Irregular—
Gooseberries On
Market TodayPORTLAND, Ore., May 23 (AP)—
Strawberries went a-begging on
local wholesale markets this morning
with supplies large and demand
comparatively light.Prices were decidedly irregular.
Commission men were asking from
\$2.50 to \$3 for Kennebec offerings,
but little was sold at these
prices.Some good quality gooseberries
were offered today and sold mostly
at 5c per pound.
Lambos showed no improvement
on local dressed meat markets, sup-
plies still far exceeding consump-
tion demand. Prices were slashed
as low as 15c by some dealers
while the very best offerings
brought only about 22 cents. Com-
mission men were advising farmers
to withhold further consignments
until the market gets in better
shape and the surplus is cleaned
up. Other classes of country meats
were about steady, but trading was
drab.Broilers were in good demand
along the poultry way with best
heavy colored bringing as high as
50 cents. Light broilers were
about steady at 25c to 26c. Current
demand is absorbing practically all
the broilers available, dealers say,
and very few have accumulated for
storing.No decided trend was noticeable
in the butter and egg markets al-
though medium first eggs were
quoted half a cent higher at 26 1/2c.
Other quotations were unchanged.When your boy comes to you and

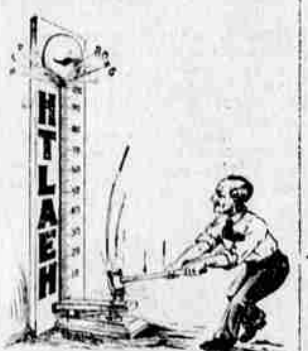

Flood Exchange;
Close Is StrongNEW YORK, May 23 (AP)—
Buying orders flooded the stock
market again today resulting in a
sensational reversal of the price
movement. The upturn was guid-
ed by powerful leaders like gen-
eral motors, radio, Montgomery
Ward, Curtiss Aero and Wright
Aero in which gains ran from 3/4
to 1 1/2 a share.
The closing was strong. The late
aggressive purchasing movement
showed very general disregard of
current monetary conditions, prices
of many specialties soaring to new
peaks. Houston Oil shot up 16
points in 40. American Interna-
tional oil, and Petroleum, Mon-
gomery Ward and American Lip-
seed 5 to 6. Old time favorites
like American Can, Studebaker,
Woolworth, General Electric and
International Harvester ruled 3
points or more higher. Total sales
approximated 2,600,000 shares.
