Resident Tuition Income Runs High

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 24 (AP)—President W. J. Kerr, of Oregon State Agricultural college, in his report to the board of regents in annual budget session yesterday, pointed out that income from resident tuition of \$12 a term, established a year ago, and non-resident tuition of \$150 a year had exceeded estimates. New appointments, budgets for the fiscal year, beginning July 1, resignations, leaves of absence and other regular business of the institution were considered by the board.

IOWANS DEVISE NEW TYPE PLOW

Attachment Is Made to Break Soil as It Is Turned—Time Saved

AMES, Iowa (AP)—A device that pulverizes soil as the plow turns it has been perfected by agricultural engineering experts at the Iowa state college. C. F. Cortes, dean of agriculture, says it is the first fundamental change in plow design in 75 years.

The invention consists of rapidly revolving ten-inch blades, set beside each plowshare to catch the soil as it is turned over. The earth is pulverized by the blades and, after being broken up, is deposited in the furrows at the right of the machine.

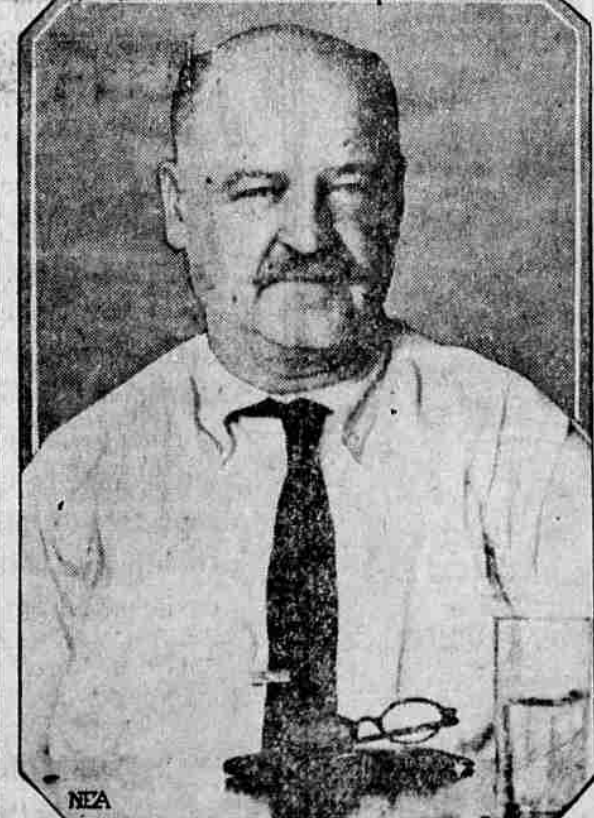
ROBBERS MAKE CLEANING

Potato Growers Will Gather In Pendleton Soon

Potato growers of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana will meet in Pendleton next Monday in a session that will include discussion of potato grades and grade problems in the Pacific Northwest with a hope that as a result recommendations can be formulated for uniform grade regulations and enforcement covering the four states.

The gathering will be of an advisory nature and its findings will be in the shape of recommendations to growers and state officials in charge of grade regulations and enforcement. The meeting has been called and will be held under the auspices of the advisory board of the Pacific Northwest potato show, at the commercial association rooms in the Elk's building beginning at nine o'clock in the morning.
