CHICAGO, May 24 (AP)—Open-
ing 1/4 to 1/2 higher, wheat after-
wards showed material further
gains. Corn, oats and provisions
were likewise stronger, with corn
starting 1/2 off to 1/2 up and sub-
sequently establishing a general ad-
vance.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1/2 to 1/2
off to 1/2 up; corn 1/2 to 1/2 up;
oats showing 1/4 to 1/2 up;
advance, and provisions at a rise
of 2 to 10c.

BERRIES WEAK IN PORTLAND MART

Bing Cherries Selling at
25c—Garden Truck
Is Firmer

PORTLAND, Ore., May 24 (AP)—
Except for depressed weak-
ness in strawberries, wholesale
produce markets were fairly steady
here today and trading was brisk.
Strawberries were selling at un-
heard of prices early this morning,
excellent local offerings going to
the trade around \$1.75 to \$2.25 per
crate of 22 pints. Kennebec ber-
ries were going even cheaper, some
as low as 25c per box, but supplies
were about cleaned up.

From now on, local dealers do
not look for any exceptional local ber-
ries.

Some unusually fine Bing cher-
ries arrived by express today and
sold quickly at 25c per pound.
Asparagus, rhubarb and spinach
were all a trifle firmer, the first
bringing 90c to \$1 per dozen while
others both sold around 23c per box.

Butter and egg prices were
steady with the exception of an
increase of 1/2c in the quotation
of standard first eggs to 23c per
dozen. Yesterday's receipts were:
Butter 21,335 pounds; eggs 2,029
cases. Storage holdings were: But-
ter 259,333 pounds; eggs 55,923
cases. Indications are for firm
markets in both butter and eggs
during the remainder of the week.
Poultry and country dressed
meat prices were unchanged. Veal
was in active demand but other
classes were rather drab.

There will be no livestock mar-
ket at North Portland yards on
Memorial day, May 26.

Roseburg Expects Large Prune Crop

ROSEBURG, Ore., May 24 (AP)—
Present estimates are that Dou-
glas county will have between five
and six million pounds of prunes
this year. Indications point to a
normal crop of Peleates and about
15 per cent crop of Italians. All
prunes will be dried except those
taken by local canneries.

OFFERS CITY AUDITORIUM
PENDLETON (AP)—John Vert,
pioneer wheat grower of Canada
and Umalla county, has offered
to build the city a \$65,000 audi-
torium and museum building as a
memorial to his wife. A special
election has been called to decide
whether the gift will be accepted.
Plans call for a fireproof structure
with auditorium, stage and dining
room. It would house a collection
of pioneer and Indian relics.

Closing Strong In Wall Street; Sales Run High

NEW YORK, May 24 (AP)—
Stock prices made further recov-
ery in today's market. A flurry of
selling swept through the market
at midday, but offerings were well
absorbed, and the market resumed
its rise under the leadership of
the steel, sugar, copper, food and
airplane shares. Trading showed
a moderate expansion in volume.
Adams Express, which soared 17
points yesterday, made a similar
gain today. Curtiss Aeroplane ran
up nearly 31 points and Wright
7 1/2, losing half of their gains in
the noon selling movement and
then heading upward again. Nat-
ional Biscuit, International Har-
vester, Colorado Fuel, International
Telephone, and Collins and Alk-
man sold 4 to 6 points higher.

The closing was strong. Studen-
baker responded to the purchase of
individual blocks ranging 5,000 to
15,000 shares by marching up to
\$1 1/2, the highest since 1924. Con-
current strength also was shown by
many other stocks which are easi-
ly moved. Radio sold 19 points
above its early low. International
Nickel and Brooklyn Edison jump-
ed 5 points and Pacific Coast and
Otis Steel led the fast movers
among the low priced issues. Total
sales approximated 2,700,000
shares.
