MARATHONERS ON LAST LAP TODAY

Andrew Payne, of Claremore, Okla., Seems Certain of First Place

PASSAIC, N. J., May 26 (AP)—With the dust of 3,400 miles on their shoes but their faces free of whiskers, several weeks old, C. C. Pyrie's foot sore and dog-tired banjo derbyists shuffle their weary way from Passaic to New York this evening and end their trans-continental foot race with a 20-mile jog in Madison Square Garden tonight.

Of the original company of 200 who started from Los Angeles on March 4, only 55 remain. Somewhere along the 3,000 miles of road lie the wrecked hopes of the rest. Nothing short of a serious accident can prevent Andrew Payne, Claremore, Okla., youth, from carrying off first prize of \$25,000.

With something less than 40 miles to go, Payne leads his nearest competitor, John Salo, Passaic, N. J., by more than 16 hours. Salo cut deeply into the Oklahoman's lead on yesterday's 24.7 mile lap from Suffern to Passaic whose residents turned out en masse to greet their fellow townsman. Salo, leading the field, covered the distance in 2:49:26.

The elapsed times of the two leaders for the 3,190.1 miles from Los Angeles were: Payne 668:36:33; Salo, 584:54:08.

Oregon Man in Race. Allan Currier, Rogue River, Ore., covered yesterday's lap to Passaic in 4:54:45. His elapsed time was 718:09:54.

The derbyists leave Passaic at 5:30 this afternoon, travel 12 miles to Weehawken and then ferry across the Hudson to New York and thence to the garden.

ROSEBURG, May 26 (AP)—Dr. George A. Cathey, of Portland, Captain C. H. Stiles, of Los Gatos, Cal., Earl Ulrich, Roseburg, archer and Professor D. G. Thompson of Corvallis, returned last night from a bow and arrow hunting trip in the Umpqua national forest. They spent ten days in the Oak Plains district and were successful in killing a large black bear.
