REVENUE CUT BILL IS SENT TO PRESIDENT

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Congressional action on the \$145,000,000 second deficiency appropriations bill was completed today with senate approval of the conference report.

The measure now goes to the White House. It is the last of the annual supply bills and carries funds for many projects authorized this session, including \$14,000,000 for beginning Mississippi river flood control work.

SIGNS TWO BILLS

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—President Coolidge signed today a bill carrying \$75,000,000 for federal aid to states for road construction.

The president also signed a bill authorizing the appropriation of \$150,000,000 for federal aid to states road construction. Half of the amount \$75,000,000 would be available this year and the remainder next year.

APPROVE RIVER MEASURE

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—A rivers and harbors bill authorizing \$45,500,000 to be expended on navigation improvement projects in various sections of the country was approved today by the house rivers and harbors committee.

HOWARD LEADS LYNCH—INDIANAPOLIS, May 26 (AP)—Charles T. Howard of Chicago, incumbent, had a lead of more than 15,000 votes over James M. Lynch of Syracuse, N. Y., his opponent, in the race for president of the International Typographical union, with more than two-thirds of the votes counted, union officials reported today.

MARY HICKMAN ARRESTED—KANSAS CITY, May 26 (AP)—Miss Mary Hickman, sister of Wm. Edward Hickman, under sentence of death for the murder of Marion Parker in Los Angeles, was held today for investigation by police, who said she had admitted obtaining clothing from department stores under false pretenses.

Lamar Robbers Still At Large; Search Intense

DIGHTON, Kans., May 26 (AP)—Roused by the slaying of a physician called to dress the wounds of one of four desperadoes who Wednesday killed two officials of a bank at LaMar, Colo., hundreds of possesmen from four states today were patrolling the rough country north of here.

Discovery of the body of Dr. W. W. Wineinger, of Dighton, near Oakley, in west central Kansas yesterday, centered the search in that district. The physician was lured from his home here Thursday night by a man who said a friend had been injured in a tractor accident. The doctor's body was found by a road about 25 miles south of Oakley. He had been shot in the head and had been dead only a short time when officers reached the scene shortly after noon. His automobile had been pushed over an embankment.

A note scrawled on a shoe box cover was found in the car.

Stunt Flier Jumps 4200 Feet Safely

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., May 26 (AP)—When the propeller fell off his airplane Al Wilson, stunt flier and former Canadian army aviator, leaped with his parachute from a height of 4200 feet and descended in the midst of traffic of Hollywood boulevard. His disabled plane crashed in the mansion of Frank H. Spearman, the novelist and was wrecked.

Wilson was rushed to the hospital where physicians said he had dislocated his right arm and wrenched his back.
