Kansas Manhunt Continues; New Trail Is Taken

OAKLEY, Kans., May 28 (AP)—Discovery of a mattress and bed springs in a canyon about 25 miles south of here today sent police to this district in an effort to pick up the trail of the four desperadoes who robbed a bank at Lamar, Colo., Wednesday night last.

The mattress and springs were concealed by reeds and grass a short distance from where Dr. W. W. Winesinger, of Dighton, Kans., was slain after he had been called to treat one of the robbers, wounded by LaMar bankers. Officers believe the wounded man may have been in two serious conditions to move and that his companions kept him in the canyon while possumen searched western Kansas and parts of Colorado, Nebraska and Wyoming.

Prior to finding of the improvised bed, many of the volunteers returned to their homes. Several men who aided in the search since Dr. Winesinger was kidnaped Thursday night, again joined in the man hunt today.

160 BODIES REMOVED

MATHER, Pa., May 28 (AP)—Eight bodies were taken from the Mather mine today and the total number removed from the workings that were torn by an explosion a week ago last Saturday was increased to 160. Mine officials said that 15 bodies still were in the mine.

BAKER AND HOUSE OF DAVID TEAMS COMING TO CITY

La Grande to Play Baker Wednesday and Sunday—Whiskers Here on Friday.

Baseball fans of the La Grande territory who have been eager to see more games will have their wishes granted this week.

As a matter of fact, the Pirates, undefeated leaders of the Hi-Mountain league teams, will play just three games in La Grande from Wednesday to Sunday. In the afternoon league contest and two exhibition hits.

Wednesday, 2 p. m.—La Grande vs. Baker at 3 o'clock, exhibition. Friday—La Grande vs. House of David, exhibition.
Sunday—La Grande vs. Baker, 2:30 o'clock, league game.

Plenty of Action
The three games all promise to be top-notchers. Baker is of practically the same strength as the Pirates and in addition, is particularly anxious to avenge a brace of early season La Grande victories. Pendleton's lot is remaining the Elephants yesterday 2 to 2 in a 14-inning contest is also likely to put the Baker crew on edge for a hot hit.

Then the regular league game next Sunday will be a scorcher, regardless of the outcome of the exhibition game. La Grande's position at the top of the league is so strong that Baker would have to win all of the remaining games while La Grande was dropping five out of six in order to copy the present, which is mathematically possible but is regarded as extremely unlikely by local fans. The House of David game Friday looks just about as tough as anything could be, according to the Pirate leaders. The Benton Harbor boys, in spite of their whiskers, play a hard ball that has won them many games with organized league teams, ranging from Class D outfits to big league crews.

The House of David team is not connected in any way with the Bearded Beauties, who played here early in the season, and baseball fans declare that the House of David boys could defeat the Beauties six out of seven games any time and any place.

In respective strength, it appears that the Pirates and Baker are the much stronger than La Grande and a win by the Pirates would add much to their prestige.

Strong Pitching Staff
La Grande has a strong pitching staff ready for the coming games. On Wednesday the Pirates will use Lyle Higbee, of Bend, in the Williams valley league, whose slants have been puzzling Western Oregon sluggers all season. Higbee is a leecher of Carson Higbee, who was with the Portland Beavers this spring.

On Friday, Phil Hansen, who defeated Walla Walla here a week ago, will be the choice and Nolan Buckner, who has five victories to his credit this year, will face the Baker hitters in the league game next Sunday. Hartman, reserve pitcher, who defeated the Emmalla Indians and the Bearded Beauties, will be ready to go into any of the games if the pitcher should get into grief.

Wheat Outlook In Umatilla Co. Reported Bright

PENDLETON, May 28—While the spring wheat in this section needs rain the fall wheat is not adversely affected, in the opinion of Henry W. Collins, Pendleton grain man.

"It is difficult to tell just how much moisture there is in the ground," says Mr. Collins. "However, farmers state that unless there is rain in the next two weeks the spring wheat will suffer. All over the county the wheat is in good shape at present."

Mr. Collins states that in Sherman county, where the wheat is practically all Turkey Red, that the grain shows excellent promise.

Gilliam Gets Rain
In Gilliam county, he states there was a good rain recently with the exception of the region in the north end of the county. "Rain is needed there," he said. "Morrow county wheat needs rain badly."

Mr. Collins estimates that harvest will begin in the light lands July 16 and in other sections about July 20.

There is no contracting for crops at present, he says, with the exception of an occasional lot. The old crop is well cleaned up and practically none of it remains.

NEW YORK, May 28 (AP)—The 55 survivors of the 242.8-mile marathon which ended in Madison Square garden Saturday night, were nursing their feet today, and otherwise recuperating from the hard grind. Many of them were preparing to participate in a 24-hour race next Friday night, when the winners are to be paid off.

Andrew Payne, 21, of Claremore, Okla., won the race with elapsed time 27:04:24. John Sale, Placerville, N. J., was second with 28:48:15. Allan Currier, Rogue River, Ore., finished in sixteenth place. About 1,500 persons were in Madison Square garden to witness the final grind. A prize of \$100 was offered a mile sprint and many of the runners lined up. Allan Currier won this race, and was paid the \$100 on the spot.

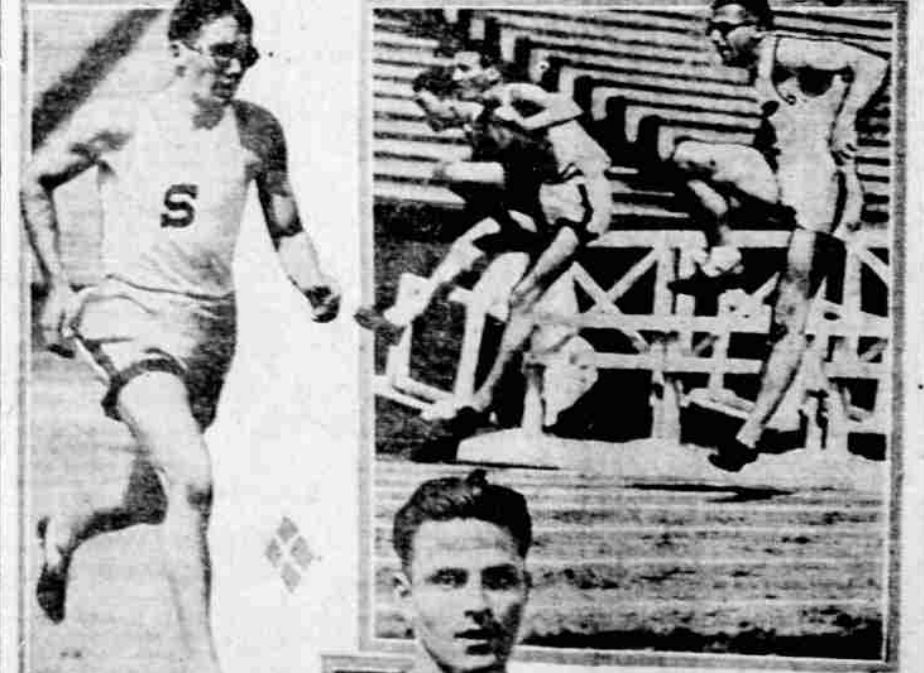
