Willamette Up Higher And Peak Not Yet Reached

PORTLAND, Ore., May 28 (AP)—With the Willamette river standing at 25.3 this morning at 7 o'clock and a further rise of better than a foot forecast within the next 48 hours, basements are being flooded with sewage water and telephone conduits along the water front are threatened with flooding. The high water at Portland is due to the high stage of the Columbia, which is being fed by melting snow waters from the Cascades.

The upper Columbia already has passed the 1927 high water mark. With cooler weather prevailing in the northwest, melting of snow in the mountains will be checked. If there is no material change in the weather during the next few days, flood dangers will continue to abate.

General rains throughout the northwest will lower the fire hazard and halt several fires that have been burning during the past week.

UMATILLA BILL PASSED

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—The house today passed a senate bill to set aside 7000 acres of land for use of Umatilla Indians in Oregon for grazing purposes. The measure was returned to the senate for action on a minor house amendment. The lands which were formerly part of the Indian reservation would be under the measure withheld from sale by the interior department.

WEATHER VERY COLD

The weather continued extremely cold and there was a bitter wind with fog over the mountains to the north.

The view prevailed generally today that the search for the missing airship should first be undertaken at Northeast land. It was pointed out that the last message from the airship came at 9 a. m. Greenwich time (4 a. m. eastern standard time) on Friday and it reported the airship on an easterly course and the belief of her navigators was that she had been about 155 miles north of Morfen Island at 3 o'clock that morning. Morfen Island is about 50 miles east of Northeast land.

In that region there are several winter houses where the crew of the Italia might find shelter in case of a landing. Several hunters living there have already seen the Italia in flight and would be constantly on the look out for her.
