## Bridge Pointers

We are continuing today the consideration of bidding situations both simple and complex.

Today's Hand

♠-X  
♥-K-J-X-X  
♦-A-X-X  
♣-A-X-X

Three questions concerning the above hand, score in all cases low all. How many can you answer? Make up your mind before you read the answers which follow?

1. What should South (Dealer) declare, holding the above hand?
2. What should North (Third Hand) declare with it: South having bid one Spade and West having passed?
3. What should North (Third Hand) declare with it: South having bid one No Trump and West having passed?

The Answers

1. One Heart. Five-card King-Jack suits should be bid initially whenever the hand holds two quick side tricks, and in this case such tricks are supplied by two Minor Aces. To bid a No Trump with this hand would be unsound even if the King of Hearts were the Ace, in a hand that contains an unstopped suit and a hideable five-card Major, the Major is the sounder bid.
2. One No Trump. The partner has shown strength in the unstopped Major suit and, having the two Minor Aces, No Trump promises better results than two Hearts would.
3. Two Hearts. While this hand contains unusual assistance for partner's No Trump, two Hearts would be an "insurance" bid. South's No Trump may have been based upon a holding of King-Queen in both Minors and Ace-Queen of Hearts, with the Spades unstopped. If so, game probably could not be made at No Trump but would be easy in Hearts. On the other hand, if South's No Trump has been bid with short North—as it shows strength—will enable South to bid two No Trumps and thus the Heart take-out insurance game no matter what the character of South's hand may be. 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**EAT MILK AND EGGS. JAPAN IS EXHORTED**

TOKYO (AP)—The Japanese must drink more milk and eat more eggs if they hope to build up physical constitutions which will enable them to enter international competition, according to Koken Itikami of the metropolitan police board.

"In order to improve themselves physically," said Itikami, "the Japanese should have better foodstuffs than they have been eating. Unless they build up their bodies they cannot compete successfully with other peoples of the world."

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Studies of beetle depredations in the yellow pine forests of western California reveal the insects have the peculiar faculty of attacking weaklings and the less prosperous trees, sometimes considered injurious to good timber growth. Foresters say the insects are better than the specialists at detecting trees that have reached a retrogressive stage.

## MENUS

**Breakfast**—Stewed prunes, cereal, cream, baked veal cakes with tomato sauce, popovers, milk, coffee.

**Luncheon**—Cream of apparatus soup, croquettes, raw vegetable salad, rhubarb and strawberry pie, milk, tea.

**Dinner**—Planked fish with stuffed tomatoes, new potatoes in cream sauce, jellied cucumber salad, fudge cake, milk, coffee.

Very finely shredded cabbage, grated carrots, grated beets, and a little scraped onion are combined with a Russian salad dressing to make the luncheon salad. This combination can be varied to suit individual tastes by adding finely chopped celery or grated raw parsnip in place of the beets or carrots.

## HEALTH

**COMPETITION AND NERVES**

WASHINGTON (AP)—The hurry, strain and keen competition of modern life has added greatly to the toll of nervous disorders among city dwellers. Nervousness, neurasthenia, "overworked" and "temperamental" individuals appear to be more nervous.

Studies of nervous disorders by the public health service and other workers have established that individuals are as affected in their mental as in their physical resistance. Some, able to bear the stress, are better fitted for the hurry and competition of city life than others who might break down under the same conditions but could maintain their usefulness in a less exacting environment.

As civilization becomes more complex and the demands of life more exacting it is apparent to the public health officials that the way must be found whereby the ordinary person can meet the requirements of successful competition in every day affairs. In this, as in many other problems of health, they feel that the basic need is laid in the training of the child to understand that different individuals have different capacities and that it is well to do one's best at all times, but not well to be striving always to outstrip the other fellow.

Few if any children have suffered nervous breakdowns as a result of their class room work, they do during war years, they are victims to the nervous strain of competition and desire to lead and excel, coupled with the realization that they are not attaining their goal. Many young persons thus stimulated beyond their capacities become introspective and melancholy.

The "overworked" business or professional person and the society woman who suffer nervous conditions as owing their condition to similar overexertion of their abilities. For the adult who finds himself worrying, staying awake and losing his mental control they advise prompt consultation of a psychiatrist or physician skilled in the treatment of nervous diseases before an actual mental disorder develops.

## THE GARDEN

**LATE SOWINGS OF ZINNIA**

Zinnias do not make rapid growth until the weather is warm and they may be sown rather late in the season and still give excellent displays, making up in rapidity of growth what was lost in delay. For interest in planting late sown zinnias are best sown where they are to remain to avoid the check of transplanting, planting three or four seeds to a hill two and a half feet apart for the large flowering types and 18 inches for the dwarf sorts and then thinning to a single plant. They will make rapid growth especially if encouraged with fertilizer and not much of their season will be lost.

The zinnia has developed into flowers of huge size and brilliant coloring that make it one of the most gorgeous of garden subjects. The dahlia-flowered strain is one of the finest, the curled petals resembling the formality and stiffness of the older types. The colossal still remains a favorite with its wide range of brilliant colors.

The dwarf smaller flowering sorts are gaining great popularity as bedding plants and for edgings, the double filiput or pompon strain being particularly fine for the latter purpose, the compact bushes being studded with brilliant buttons of bloom.

The large flowering dwarf strain is the most satisfactory for bedding and patches of solid colors of this type make beautiful displays in the garden and furnish a great wealth of material for bouquets. The salmon rose variety is one of the most popular varieties in this series.

They range in height from 15 inches to 4 feet from the pompons to the colossal, so that a great variety of effects may be produced.

A curled and crested strain is unusual and fantastic white the picotee type has large flowers, each petal tipped with a different color, the light shades with crimson and the darker ones with light tips.

Red Riding Hood, a miniature zinnia with brilliant scarlet double flowers, has become one of the best liked of the small types for brilliant display. It is a beautiful edging plant. Give the zinnias rich soil, full sun and plenty of moisture and they will come a structure and they will come into bloom very quickly and give a continuous display.

It is time to think about getting cucumbers and summer squashes going. Dig a hole, drop in a shovel of shredded cow manure, wet it

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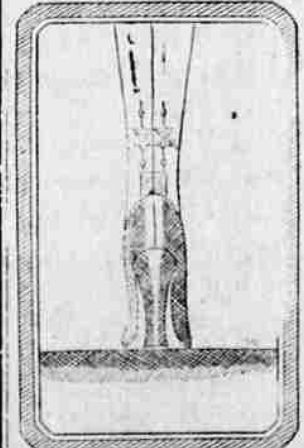
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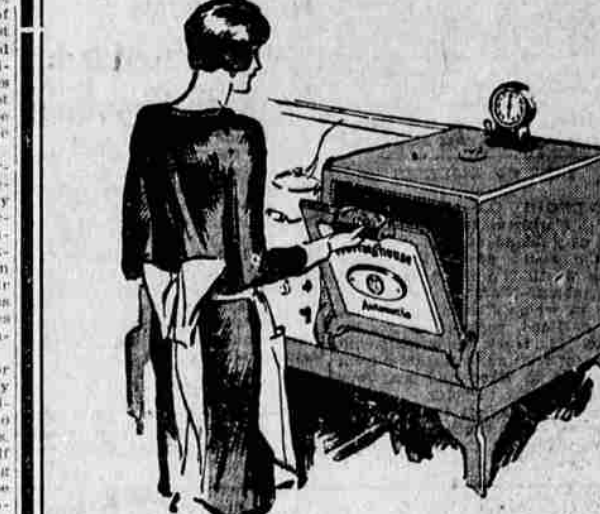
## CHICKEN With Home-made Egg Noodles

Get a nice fat hen, have it drawn, wash good and place in a large kettle with a veal bone, 1 carrot, 1 sprig of celery, slice of onion. Boil until done, strain the broth, then add noodles. Cook 15 minutes longer, add to noodles 2 hard boiled eggs cut in quarters; add 1/2 cup cream and serve. Make a gravy for the chicken out of 2 cups of the broth, adding a little lemon juice, parsley and a little cream.
