Eggs Higher On Portland Market; Butter Steady

PORTLAND, Ore., May 29 (AP)—Better grade eggs were higher on local wholesale markets this morning following a cent increase in the quotations on standard extra and standard firsts to 28c and 24c, respectively. Outside demand for eggs was more active than for some time, while receipts were quite light at 341 cases yesterday. No changes were quoted in butter prices.

Veal was firmer with best light veal at 19c. Other classes of veal inclined to weakness.

Light and medium hens were easier, both classes selling around 29c. Fryers were also easy.

Strawberry receipts were lighter today but prices were not greatly affected. Most prices ranged from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per crate. Many berries showed rain damage.

Motor Shares Bought Heavily In Wall Street

NEW YORK, May 29 (AP)—Heavy buying of motor shares based in part on expectations of favorable second quarter earnings statements, turned the course of stock prices upward today after a sorry period of irregularity. Early declines of 1 to 2 points in many instances were cut down, or wiped out, and more than two score issues were marked up 1 to nearly 35 points. Trading was fairly heavy for a pre-holiday session, sales crossing the 2,000,000 share mark before the end of the third hour.

The closing was firm. Attempts to cash in some of the paper profits accruing from the spurt in motor 2 1/2 o'clock indicated a broad decline running from 2 to 2 1/2 points in many instances. Several stocks, however, stuck to their tasks. Remington Rand rising to a new high of 25 1/2, with a block of 12,000 shares at 25. Radio crossed 206, while International Harvester touched 230. Total sales approximated 2,300,000 shares.

Wheat Closes At A Lower Figure

CHICAGO, May 29 (AP)—Opening at 1/2 decline to 117 1/2, wheat rose all around, but later dropped to well below yesterday's finish. Corn was relatively firm, starting at a shade off to 1/2c up and subsequently showing a general advance. Oats were easy. Provisions held steady.

Wheat closed 1/2 to 3/4c net lower, corn 3/4 to 2 1/2c net off, oats 1/2 to 1 1/2c down and provisions varying from 2 1/2c decline to an equal advance.
