New Alfalfa Is Able To Stand Northern Chill

WASHINGTON (AP)—Originating in the Ladakh province of Northern India, a new alfalfa known to department of agriculture specialists as "Ladak" is expected to withstand to a large degree the rigors of North American winters.

J. L. Westover, federal agronomist, says Ladak consistently has shown somewhat less winter killing than the hardy commercial alfalfas such as Grimm and the Northern Common, and in a majority of cases has yielded a somewhat larger tonnage of hay and generally has produced better seed crops.

The strain was introduced to the United States 18 years ago as a small package of seed. After nine years of careful work, the department obtained a quantity of seed large enough for test planting. While the supply of seed now commercially available is limited, the department says it is probable there soon will be a considerable increase from sowings made in 1927.

From the first Ladak attracted attention because of its unusually vigorous growth, apparent resistance to drought and cold, and its abundant seeding habits. The hay is considered of better quality than a number of other alfalfas, having finer stems and being more leafy.

It has not been as seriously affected by bacterial wilt, and is especially valuable in those regions where a short growing season and lack of moisture make only one cutting possible.

AT THE THEATERS

William Boyd At Colonial in "Night Flyer"

No boy is more loyal to his dog than is the old engineer or fireman to his locomotive, according to railroad legends. This love of his engine by William Boyd, starring as a railroad fireman in "The Night Flyer," James Cruze's new production for Pathe-DeMille, is perhaps the most interesting feature of the story.

Walter Lang, who directed the picture, has caught the spirit exactly and built it to greater proportions. "The Night Flyer" is playing at the Colonial today. Johnna Halston plays opposite the star.

It is because of Boyd's love that the division superintendent of the Y. M. and T. H. H. preserves old "29," one of the most famous engines of the West. When old "29" makes her last mad rush across the plains with the United States mail, reaching its destination on time, the locomotive seems almost human as it puffs before the station while Boyd caresses her, tears in his eyes.

"Engineers and firemen regard their mounts as human," an old-timer in the railroad yards told Cruze and Lang. "These men call their engines by pet names. They take loving care of them, keeping them polished and oiled. If they gave as much attention to their own wives, these women would probably wonder if their husbands were gone suddenly crazy."

ACQUSE U. S. DEPARTMENT FOR MARKET COLLAPSE

Other members of the cast are well chosen for their roles with special credit due to Richard Tucker, Leo Moran, Jack Raymond, Kate Price and Trixie Friganza. Directional honors go to William A. Seiter, Miss La Plante's husband.
