Arrives for Convention—
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Suspect Jailed In Ohio Result Of Girl's Death

TOLEDO, Ohio, May 29 (AP)—New evidence, the nature of which police declined to reveal, aided attempts today to fasten the "hame" for the abduction and slaying of Dorothy Michalski, 7, upon a 25-year-old chauffeur, arrested last night. His name was withheld.

Dr. Edmund A. Pallinski, a dentist, determined from an examination of the victim's body that the slayer had a missing front tooth, Coroner Frank G. Kretz said.

Inspector Huck declined to discuss the evidence against the chauffeur but it was reported that his teeth corresponded with the mark on the girl's body.

He also was said to be familiar with the layout of the home. This was important, the police said, for the slayer apparently had a pass key to the house and knew exactly the room where Dorothy and her three sisters, Stella, 15, Leonora, 5, and Caroline, 2, were sleeping.

Plane Ready For Trip to Australia

OAKLAND, Cal., May 29 (AP)—The tri-motored Fokker Monoplane Southern Cross today was practically ready to start the 7,788-mile flight from the Golden Gate to Australia, only a final few flight remaining of preparatory measures.

The plane is scheduled to take off at 9 a. m. tomorrow, and weather predictions indicated that conditions would be favorable between here and Honolulu, the first stop.

Besides Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith, the members of the plane's crew are: Charles T. P. Finn, roller pilot; Harry W. Lyons, Jr., navigator; and James Warner, radio operator.

N. J. SINNOTT RESIGNS
SALEM, Ore., May 29 (AP)—The resignation of Representative N. J. Sinnott, Oregon's congressman from the second district, reached Governor Patterson by telegraph last night, to be effective May 31. As announced two months ago Sinnott has been appointed a member of the federal court of claims. Since there will not be another session of congress until after the election of Sinnott's successor in November it will not be necessary for the governor to call a special election to fill the vacancy.

OREGON VOTE COUNTED

SALEM, Ore., May 29 (AP)—A total of 191,129 votes was cast for Herbert Hoover in the republican preferential vote for president on May 18 and Frank O. Lowden received 132,2 votes. The name of Akred E. Smith, the democratic candidate, was written in by 71 republicans and 374 votes were scattering. These official totals were announced yesterday by Secretary of State Koser upon receipt of official returns from all counties.

For vice president the republican vote was: John H. Hall, 68,625; Hamilton Fish, 22,895; W. Grant Webster, 8,129; Senator McNary's name was written in 1,167 times and 123 votes were scattering.

Alfred E. Smith democratic candidate for president, received 17,444 votes; Thomas J. Walsh received 11,272; James A. Reed, 6,360 and Alonza F. Workman 881. Milton A. Miller of Portland, received 22,824 votes for vice-president.

PEACE PLEA SOUNDED BY MR. COOLIDGE

Secretary of state of the United States in their joint efforts to find a solution of the problem of peace may find practical realization in the early making of a multilateral treaty limiting future resort to war.

Mr. Coolidge also praised the conclusion of arbitration treaties and the resolution approved at the Havana Pan-American Conference calling for a Pan-American compulsory arbitration covenant.

"The peace of the world cannot, of course, be obtained by any one single act," he said. "But every treaty of arbitration and conciliation and every agreement resorting to war adds another barrier against those conflicts which from time to time have occurred in the history of nations."

Touches on Crime

Declaring that the peaceful spirit of a nation must originate by the people, the president added that "while the people of the United States as a whole are peaceful and law-abiding to a remarkable degree, it cannot be denied that we have had sporadic outbreaks of crime, especially those of violence, which are exceedingly disturbing."

"Such a condition will indicate, if continued, a loosening of the moral fiber of the nation. It is very easy to cast the blame upon the police authorities, the prosecuting officers, and the courts. But if a criminal condition continues to prevail, the blame goes beyond these officials. We live under a system of popular government. Our officers reflect to a very large degree public opinion."

"If the people themselves show that they are determined to have crime stamped out, there will be no lack of adequate penalty on the part of the courts."

To insure the maintenance of a government of law and not of men," Mr. Coolidge said, "it was essential that all officers and all executive judicial and legislative bodies should adhere strictly to the authority with which they have been clothed."

J. J. PERSHING SPEAKS

THATCOURT, France May 29 (AP)—Millions of graves cry out against war and the big nations must show the way to durable peace, General John J. Pershing told an assemblage of French and Americans at St. Mihiel cemetery today after he had strewn flowers on the graves of American war dead.

The war that threatened civilization came, he said, because of the "fallacious theory that war is an essential element in the national policy of a government and an erroneous belief that nations become great through aggressive undertakings carried on regardless of right and justice. Against such views, the reasoning of cabinets and the creation of ententes too often have shown themselves powerless."

COOLIDGE AT GETTYSBURG

GETTYSBURG, Pa., May 29 (AP)—President Coolidge arrived by special train at the western Maryland station at 1:47 o'clock this afternoon to pay the tribute of the nation to the memory of the men who gave their lives to their country during the Civil war.

The chief executive was greeted by Governor Fisher and local and state dignitaries and was driven to the national cemetery south of town.

La Grande Air Field Personals

LA GRANDE AIRFIELD (Special)—After a flight of two hours, "Bus" O'Connell and Herman Mires, accompanied by their pilot, Lionel Kay, landed at the field here from Boise, at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon. The boys are en route to London, Ore., where the horse races are coming off soon and they intend to carry out a program of passenger flights during the time.

O'Connell and Mires have been at Boise for the past two months doing an excellent business in barnstorming. Pilot Kay, whose home is in California, has been piloting their plane for them most of the time and is considered a first class aviator with a great deal of experience. He has secured a position on the Varney airmail route and will begin his duties this fall. The two expects to return to Union for the stock show and to do commercial flying there at that time.

Joe Taft, pilot of the airmail route between Boise and Pasco passed over the field here Monday

afternoon in a new Stearman airplane, the first of this kind of machine to be put on by the Varney Air Lines. The company has been using the Swallow airplanes, one of the commercial types that gives rugged, efficient and economical service, but as the volume of business is increasing so rapidly, the line is replacing the Swallow by the larger and more powerful Stearman machine. The plane has a cruising speed of 150 miles per hour—just twice that of the Swallow. The new ship is the same kind that Fred Hoyt, who was test pilot for Stearman Aircraft company, was flying when he lost his life in the mountains of Idaho last winter.

Flying a De Havilland ship belonging to Lieutenant Oakley Kelley, who has charge of the government flying field at the Hawaiian Islands, Captain Eagle passed over the field here Monday evening on his way from Vancouver, Wash., to Baker and Nampa, Idaho, to visit with relatives. Captain Eagle is manager of the Pearson flying field at Vancouver, which place was formerly manned by Lieutenant Kelley before the government transferred him to the Hawaiian field.

W. C. Rush of the Bush Flying Service of Portland landed at the department of commerce airways field one day last week and attended to business in La Grande. He

was accompanied by his pilot, Basil Russell.
