

OLD SOUTHWEST
GIVES EXPOSITIONPacific Event to Be Held
at Long Beach July 23
to September 3

LONG BEACH, CAL. (AP)—The cultural and commercial evolution of the area once embraced in the old Spanish empire along the Colorado River will be reflected in the Pacific Southwest Exposition here July 23 to Sept. 3. It will commemorate the coming of the Spanish padres to the Pacific Coast, and will have the participation of 11 western states and 22 foreign nations or possessions.

With some 50 buildings of Moorish architecture making up the general exposition scheme, there will be created on the 50-acre site on the peninsula which juts out into Long Beach harbor, an oriental city suggestive of Northern Africa. Belgium is to construct a building duplicating the town hall at Brussels, set in a Flemish garden. Germany will feature the part that nation has played in world-wide transportation. A Hawaiian village is to be transplanted in its entirety from the mid-Pacific.

Spain's participation will depict its industrial development, art and culture, and its building will be supplemented by exhibits of private Spanish enterprises.

Guatemala, the Argentine, Panama, The Netherlands, Sweden, Mexico, Canada, Norway, Ecuador, Japan, New Zealand, Fiji Islands, Denmark, Uruguay, El Salvador, Java, Formosa, Sumatra, Italy, Costa Rica and other countries or possessions will have exhibits.

Romance of the old Pacific Southwest under Spanish rule is to be woven into the general theme of the exposition.

The Moorish motif in the buildings are chiefly the design of Hugh B. Davis architect, who got his inspiration from the colorful cities of northern Africa with their picturesque domes, towers, arcades and cupolas.

All classes of aircraft will be exhibited, and this portion of the exposition will be featured by the presentation to Col. Charles A. Lindbergh of a bowl made of gems and ore from the 25 nations making the presentation.

Both Elder and other famous fly-prizes have been invited to attend and prizes will be awarded to the person making the longest non-stop flight to the exposition.

Two large landing masts have been erected to permit the tying up of dirigibles that take part in a globe circling race starting from Venice and Hawaii. A reception and celebration have been planned for three Japanese aerial crews which have projected a flight from Tokyo to Seattle.

Pointers

Hog cholera is no respecter of conditions. A herd kept under the best sanitary conditions may be just as susceptible as one raised in filth, but it will be better able to withstand the effects of the disease. A preventative serum treatment is the only safeguard.

It is particularly desirable to use corn and clover seed produced in districts somewhat similar in conditions of soil and climate to the area in which it is to be planted. For example, northern states require alfalfa seed from plants that have withstood northern winters, and corn from plants that have matured before the date of early frosts.

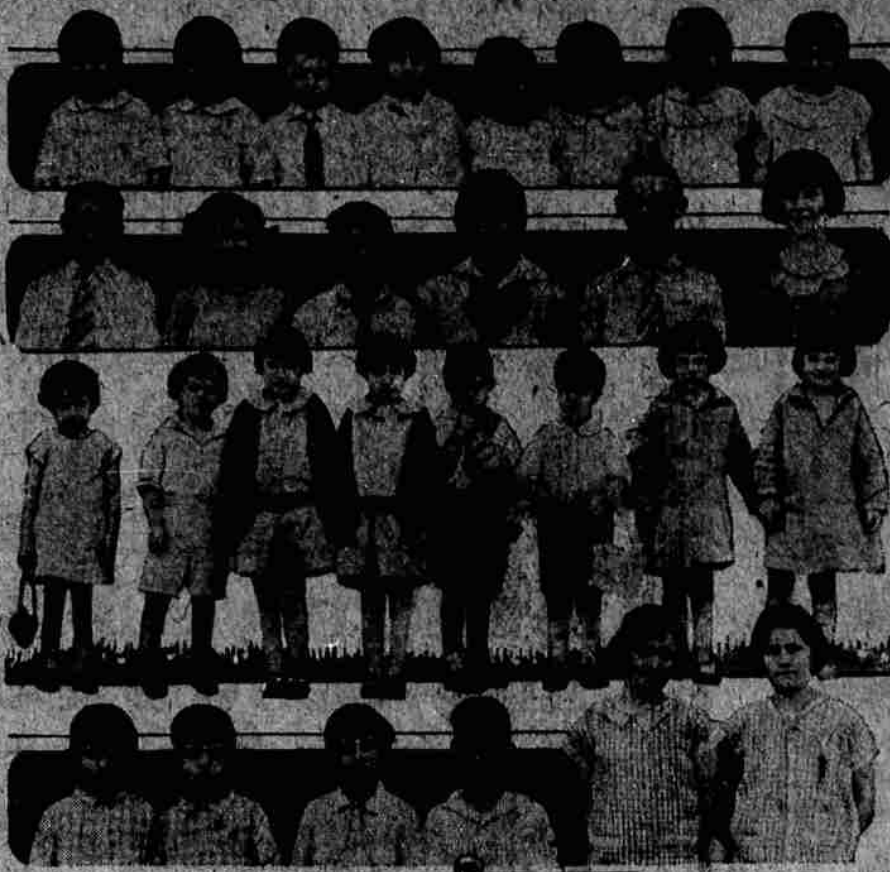
Sheep and goat lice are particularly about their habit and live only a short time when separated from their "hosts." Both biting and sucking lice normally spend their entire lives on sheep and goats and can live only a short time away from them. However, eggs of the insects may brush from the coats of the insects and continue to hatch for two or three weeks, making it advisable in warm weather to keep unfested flocks away from corals and small inclosures until they have been disinfected.

Barley is a crop generally undervalued in feeding systems. It is an excellent feed grain, ranking second to corn in areas where corn makes a good crop. In regions and on soils where it does well, it is a better feed crop than oats. Barley should be cracked or rolled for feeding, in preference to using it whole or finely ground. North of the corn belt it often is possible to grow good fodder corn for silage, using barley as a substitute for the corn grain.

Thorough sterilization of seed is recommended as a control measure against bacterial canker of tomatoes, damage of which may range from negligible injury to such complete destruction of the crop as to cause serious economic loss to the grower.

PHILIPPINE TRADE GROWS

MANILA (AP)—The \$50,000,000 worth in trade between the Philippines and the United States was passed during the first quarter of 1928. Quarterly imports of American cotton goods increased 72 percent, machinery 59 percent, mineral oils 25 percent, and flour 50 percent. Sugar showed the greatest gain among exports.

Hickman Fate Delayed While The
Courts Weigh Law Aimed to Speed

SACRAMENTO, CAL. (AP)—In California's new criminal procedure, designed to close legal loopholes through which the guilty escape the penalties of their crimes, William Edward Hickman, slayer of 12-year-old Marian Parker, found at least a temporary ally.

The new code, which saved Hickman from the quick mailing out of a fate for which the public clamored, was moulded through the force of moral opinion expressed by the law's slowness and uncertainty.

Thus the "breaks" which enabled the kidnaper and killer of the daughter of a Los Angeles banker to elude for eight days capture by the police authorities of three states, have followed him past the date set for his execution.

It was his fortune to be the first brought to trial under the new code, and so he was enabled to take advantage of the delays resulting from the first testing of a criminal procedure and its constitutionality.

The efficiency of the statute was indicated to sponsors of the law by the speed with which Hickman was first found sane and then, by the same jury and almost without pause, declared guilty and sentenced to death. But the fact that the new statute had never been weighed as to constitutionality operated to save him, at least temporarily, when virtually no other factor could have served.

Jerome K. Walsh, chief counsel,

and other attorneys for the defense lost no time in carrying to the state supreme court their fight to save the condemned youth. They assailed the statute as violating both the state and federal constitutions because it permitted separate hearings on crime and mental condition. They contended that the procedure operated to "whittle away" the defendant's "common law right to trial by jury," and that if the statute were upheld it would be possible for the prosecution to split up other defenses and there could be an indefinite number of hearings.

A member of the court interposed the suggestion that Hickman had deprived himself of the complete defense by failing or refusing to enter a plea of not guilty. The California law permits a person accused of murder to plead not guilty by reason of insanity, but he can also plead not guilty of the crime, as formerly. The defense replied that the "ambiguity" of the statute kept him from entering the "not guilty" plea.

The state's attorneys declare that even if the high court's ruling in adverse Hickman could be tried again. He is also under life sentence with Welby Hunt for participation in the murder of Ivy Tomp, drugist near Los Angeles.

JAPAN SELLS FLOWERS

TOKYO (AP)—Japan last year shipped to the United States more than \$1,000,000 of flowers which no floral buyer or handler. They were pyrotechnic flowers, used for the manufacture of fireworks, and the \$1,235,000, or 4,972 tons, exported represented almost the entire Japanese crop.

AIRPORT ON LAKE

MILAN (AP)—The city of Milan has been building an airport on a lake. In fact, it built an artificial lake first, for the airport is to be an "isoleto" or port for hydro-airplanes now in service between Trieste, Venice and Turin. Until the port is ready the planes will land at Pavia on the River Po.

ITALY PROTESTS
JUGO SLAV RIOTS

Anti-Mussolini Disturbances Result in Arrests of Many

BELGRADE, Jugo Slavia, May 29 (AP)—Four students were seriously wounded and 25 others injured in a drawn battle early this morning between police and students who were demonstrating against the ratification of the Nettuno convention.

The conflict was ended at 3 a. m. when reinforcements of gendarmes and mounted policemen arrived.

A. Berdiero, Italian minister, today lodged a written protest against continued anti-Italian demonstrations in Jugo Slavia with the government. It was couched in most pre-emptory terms.

Demand for Punishment: He demanded the immediate and severe punishment of all Jugo-Slav authorities in the affected districts for their alleged laxity.

Thirty students were wounded when mounted police with drawn swords charged a group gathered on the steps of the students' home which was recently presented to the university by King Alexander. Many students were bruised in the affray when the police carried out orders to prevent any further demonstrations. Police then surrounded the building and the students were besieged within.

Burns Duke's Picture: The demonstrations started with the burning of a portrait of Premier Mussolini of Italy. Police scattered the mob, but it reassembled later and students shouted: "Down with Mussolini! down with the fascists!"

Police with fixed bayonets and mounted chased the student rioters and arrested 40.

The outbreak, with which there is much public sympathy, were in protest against alleged Italian oppression of Slav minorities and against ratification of the Nettuno treaty. The treaty permits Italian residents of Dalmatia and Slovenia to own land within 30 miles of the Adriatic coast.

THE GARDEN

PETUNIAS FOR COLOR MARSH

Petunias are one of the most faithful of all the garden annuals for producing beautiful masses of color even under most unfavorable circumstances. Seed may be sown in the open ground now and by July there will be a fine show which will increase in beauty until frost comes and the display.

The Rose Morn petunia, and its improved form is one of the most deservedly popular and most widely planted of all annuals. For edging along paths, for masses in the garden or in the border or for window boxes or pots on porches it is a certain success and always elicits admiration.

It belongs to the small flowered class and in this section there are many fine developments, particularly in the rich blue purple colors of velvet texture and in the dark reds. They require only a sunny position and good soil and will stand a lot of heat and drought which would finish many other annuals. A soaking or a rain brings them back in a hurry.

In the large flowered fringed and ruffled strains are some of the most magnificent that can be grown. They are not as free blooming as the small flowered bedding types.

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by any manner of means but a small plant with one or two of the huge beautifully frilled and marked blooms quite makes up for the lack of numbers of bloom. They are magnificent as summer pot plants for porches.

The balcony strain has leaped into great popularity. It is large flowered and also free flowering with long trailing branches that make it ideal for porch and window boxes, the long branches being studded with the large blooms in blue, rose, white and crimson. It is indispensable for porch boxes in sunny situations. The double petunias, which were favorite old-time house plants, are beautiful for bedding or for window and porch boxes.

Sow seed thinly in a shaded seed bed, merely pressing it into the soil. Be sure to keep the bed moist until
