The Memorial Day dinner at Summerville yesterday lived up to a brilliant reputation. No community event in the entire valley is more eagerly anticipated and generally participated in than this.

The state highway commission turns down all requests for new construction on the theory that its revenue is seriously threatened by the \$3 license fee propaganda. Which is all right now but just think of the deluge of requests when the lover fee is defeated!

Coolidge has eliminated Lowden, Dawes, and other farm relief candidates from the republican presidential contest by his veto of the McNary-Haugen bill, according to Mark Sullivan. If that is true, Hoover is the only remaining candidate who chooses to accept the nomination if offered. And he, in spite of the threats made in the corn belt, will carry all of the normally republican states in that area. With the conventions still to be held, the selections seem to have been made ahead of time.

Robert Crozier Long, of the London Economist, who has been studying Germany, says Germany can easily meet her reparation payments. The country, he finds, is surprisingly prosperous. Production has increased enormously, in 1927 greatly exceeding pre-war production in the old national area. Iron, steel and lignite outputs have doubled in eight years. New industries are attaining vast dimensions. Savings are growing rapidly, and already exceed the reparations liabilities six or seven times. The mere earning power of German savings accumulated in the last three years, he declares, would almost cover the maximum reparations annuity of \$625,000,000. He quotes the Frankfurter Zeitung to the effect that after paying reparations last year, Germany still saved \$2,250,000,000. This, if true, is good news for Germany's creditors, giving assurance not only of debt payments but of increased German markets for allied goods.

WE LEARN ABOUT INDIA

There have been a number of replies to Katherine Mayo, written by such authorities as Tagore, Gandhi and Mukerji, who have felt that her book, "Mother India," is most unfair to the great Indian nation. The latest of these comes from the pen of C. S. Ranga Iyer, member of the Indian legislative assembly.

Instead of refuting Miss Mayo's accusations against India, he points out bad conditions existing in America and England. Any intelligent and honest citizen of either of these countries knows and would admit that horrible and evil conditions do exist in them, along with good things. A clever person might draw the conclusion that there are also good things in India, in addition to any evils that a critical traveler discovers and points out.

But the upshot of all this controversy—for such it has become—is more interesting than the controversy itself. Says Harry Hansen, book authority of the New York World, "There are now enough recent books on India to complete a five-foot shelf. Lecturers on India are in great demand." "Mother India" continues as a best-seller, in spite of its alleged short-comings, and along with it readers are delving into other works on that great country. Education often comes in queer guise and proceeds round-about. In this matter of India it seems to be stealing unawares upon a sensation-hunting lot of readers.

2 More Horses Die of Poison At Imbler, Ore.

IMBLER, May 31 (Special)—Two more horses belonging to Theibert Choate, of near this place, died early this week as a result of getting into poison intended to kill morning glories. This makes five horses in all that have been lost, four belonging to Mr. Choate and one belonging to Heber Conrad.

Some time ago four gallon bottles of poison were secured by the late Fred Hamilton to kill the morning glories on his place. The bottles were set in the field and until recently little thought having been given to them. In some way the stoppers came loose, letting the contents run out on the ground. As soon as it was discovered the remaining containers were taken away, but even the small quantity of the liquid which was on the ground, and which had probably evaporated almost entirely, was enough to cause the death of the five work animals. Other livestock in the pasture evidently did not touch the material, as none of them were lost.

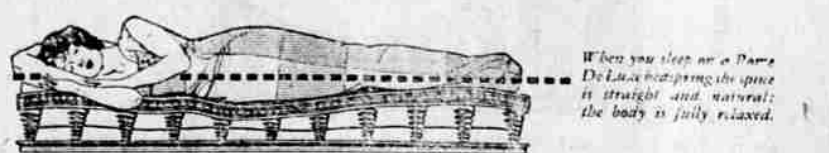
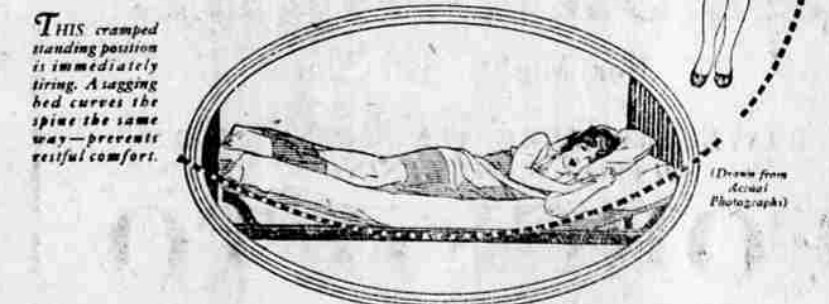

When it sailed gracefully over the bay and the San Francisco hills it was given a like acclaim by hundreds perched on the hill tops and skyscrapers to see it leave.

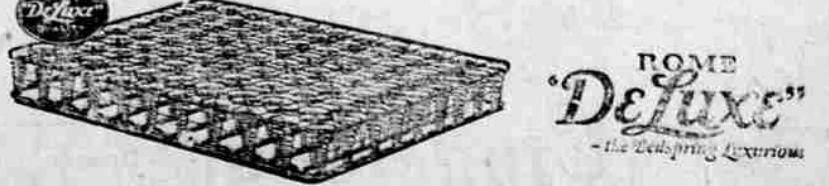
