Marion Davies In "Quality Street" at Arcade

No wiser selection than that of Marion Davies could have been made to play the role of Phoebe Throssel in Sir James Barrie's "Quality Street," which Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer has made into a film play and which opens tomorrow at the Arcade theater.

"Quality Street," known throughout the world as one of the best whimsical vehicles ever written has been endeared to the American public by Maude Adams, and more recently by Helen Hayes, both of whom played the role upon the stage which Miss Davies plays so well upon the screen.

The role demands a certain portrayal of the whimsical which not one actress in a hundred could offer with any marked degree of success.

It is to be hoped that Marion will be given more roles like it for the sake of picture-goers who, though many would deny it, appreciate a good portrayal of a classic role.

The Barrie vehicle gives Miss Davies ample opportunity to exercise her talents as a comedienne but at the same time it demands the pathos and drama in which this star is so rich.

The play is laid in provincial England early in the nineteenth century and has been extremely well directed by Sidney Franklin. Conrad Nagel, as leading man, offers his usual work. The supporting cast is unusually good.

"Night Flyer" Proves To Be A Thriller

A wild ride in a railroad engine, actually participated in by the audience watching the picture, is one of the big thrills of "The Night Flyer," James Cruze production for Pathé-DeMille, starring William Boyd, which will be on view for the last time at the Colonial theater tonight. Johnny Ralston plays opposite the star.

According to railway workers who served as technical assistants to director Walter Lang during the filming of this picture, most people who like to travel also possess a sense of adventure. Eighty per cent of those travelers would willingly relinquish their comfortable seats in the Pullman cars for the privilege of riding in the engine cab.

When Director Lang left the studio for location settings, where the rail sequences were photographed, Cruze's emphatic order was: "Get the real punch and if it is possible to give the audience the feeling that it is actually riding in the engine cab, do that too."

Lang succeeded in his purpose by building a platform behind the locomotive so that closeups of the inside of the cab were obtained. The effect, when thrown on the screen, is the person watching the picture is actually riding on the engine. This spirit of participation in the wild ride that ends in a wreck keeps the audience's nerves on edge every second.

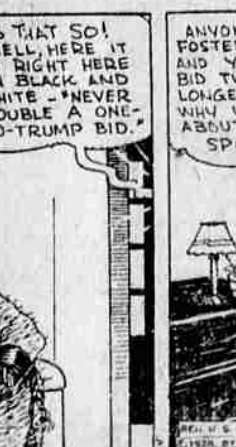
