Bulls Continue In Control Of Stock Exchange

NEW YORK, May 31 (AP)—Bullish operations were conducted on a broad scale in today's stock market. High priced specialties were whirled upward 5 to nearly 20 points, while a long list of seasoned dividend paying rails and industrials moved up 1 to 5 points, with at least a score of issues breaking into new high ground for the year. Trading showed a marked expansion in volume, sales crossing the 2 1/2 million share mark before the end of the third hour.

The closing was strong; buying spread to the rest of the list after another violent upward turn in selective shares. Radio reached 218; Adams Express jumped 17 points and American International, Midway corporation, Midland Steel Products preferred, and United States Cast Iron Pipe 6 to 8. Many other stocks that frequently move in leaps and bounds also recorded last gains which spread dismay in the ranks of the "shorts." Total sales approximated 4,000,000 shares.

Wheat Nervous And Much Lower At Close Today

CHICAGO, May 31 (AP)—Starting at 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 off, wheat later showed a material further setback. Corn and oats were easier, with corn opening unchanged to 1 1/2 down and subsequently keeping within the initial limits. Provisions were firm.

Wheat closed nervous, 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 net lower; corn 3/4 to 1 1/2 up; oats varying from 1/2 decline to 1/2 gain and provisions at 7c off to 12c advance.

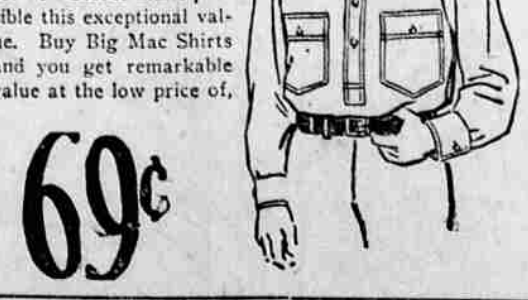
