SIX STATES BEHIND IN BIRTH REGISTRATION

WASHINGTON (AP)—A final intensive drive is being launched by the United States children's bureau in its campaign to bring every state into the birth registration area by 1930. There are six states that have not yet complied with the bureau of census requirement of a 90 per cent birth registration: Nevada, South Dakota, Colorado, New Mexico, Texas and South Carolina. The bureau, with the aid of negro physicians, was able to bring Louisiana and Georgia last year into the area.
