OPEN SPRING
CONVENTIONNearly 100 Present for
First Session of Grande
Ronde UnionSTATE PRESIDENT
SPEAKING TODAYBanquet This Evening to
Be High Light of Ses-
sions—Pageant Will Be
Presented.

With nearly 100 persons present, the annual springtime convention of the Grande Ronde Christian Endeavor Union began last night and if the opening night is any indication, the convention will exceed all expectations of the officers of the district in charge, both in attendance and enthusiasm.

Delegates began arriving yesterday afternoon, and today there are about 75 registered, with promise of three or four carloads of persons from other towns who will be here this evening and tomorrow morning for the last of the meetings.

The sessions opened with a devotional and song service led by Ross Gulley, of the Eugene Bible university, which was followed by a fellowship party in the basement of the Presbyterian church, where all the meetings are being held.

This morning the program included a song service and Bible study led by Mr. Gulley, and conference on all different phases of C. E. work, led by the four out-of-town speakers. This afternoon at 1 o'clock the meeting again began with a song service and there were talks by the different speakers, a vocal solo by Miss Myrtle Wilcock, followed by an address by the state president, Donald Nelson, of Portland, on "Our Relation to the State Union."

Banquet This Evening
One of the highlights of the convention will be the banquet this evening at 5:45, and it promises to be "full of fun and fellowship and plenty of good things to eat." The committee in charge reports. After the banquet there will be a devotional period and the report of the nominating committee will be given. After which, Dr. J. L. McPherson, will have charge of raising the budget for the coming year's work. At 8:30 the meeting will adjourn to the Christian church where the pageant will be given by the Endeavorers of that church under the leadership of Mrs. R. L. Putnam.

There is much interest being shown in the competition for the banner which will go to the society's delegation, which has the largest number of points when the convention is over, points being given on the mileage of the delegates and their attendance and promptness at the sessions. The Lostine Presbyterian church won permanently the last award which was given, due to the fact that they won it three consecutive years.

A favorable discussion of a proposed owner's division as associate members of the realty board occupied a major part of an interesting session of the La Grande Realty board at luncheon at the Sackawaw Inn yesterday.

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Chang Tso-Lin
Leaves Peking
Sunday MorningTurns over City to Shansi
Leaders Peacefully—
Situation at Tientsin Is
Tense Today.

PEKING, June 2 (AP)—(Sunday)—Chang Tso-Lin, northern dictator, left Peking on a special train for his stronghold, Mukden, Manchuria, at 1:15 o'clock this morning.

It is understood he has arranged for the Shansi leaders to take over the northern capital peacefully.

The railway station in Peking presented an extraordinary appearance late today preparatory for the departure of Chang Tso-Lin and his army for Manchuria.

Filled With Trains
The station was filled with trains, most of which were jammed with troops and officials while the platforms were piled high with baggage of all descriptions from motor cars to perambulators.

The spaces between great stacks of goods was crowded with soldiers and numbers of men and women who hoped to obtain seats on the trains. Motor cars loaded with all sorts of belongings continually dashed up to the station increasing the confusion.

Troops Crowded City
The northern dictator's own train which was due to leave at midnight was waiting in the station long before the hour of departure. A pilot train and a train containing Chang's body guard will precede it and trains containing the troops will follow.

Large number of troops were crowding through the city gates en route to their home province of Manchuria by road.

There were no signs of panic any where and the soldiers were orderly and appeared in good humor.

SITUATION IS TENSE

TIENSIN, June 2 (AP)—The situation in Tientsin was extremely tense today but not panicky. Chinese military authorities took over control of the city and the railroad station in view of the imminence of a general retreat of the northerners.

PEKING, June 2 (AP)—Reports were current today that Mukden troops of the northern alliance had been defeated at Jiaoliou, 35 miles south of Peking with 1400 casualties.

The defeat was result of severe fighting between the northern troops and Shansi province troops which are allied with the nationalists.

R. S. Hamilton Is
Leading In Race
For Speakership

SALEM, Ore., June 2 (AP)—R. S. Hamilton, of Bend, Ore., who is a candidate for the speakership of the 1929 session of the state legislature, said here today that he has assurances of 29 of the 31 votes he will need for that office.

Hamilton said he believed there is no doubt of his election.

Of the old members of the legislature who will again be members, Hamilton claims 22, and says he is assured of the votes of five new ones. One of his supporters, Theo. Cramer, of Grants Pass, was nominated in the recent primary election, but has withdrawn to accept a position in Portland with the "National Bacon" association, which has reduced Hamilton's assured vote by one.

Hamilton will see several Willamette members today, with a possibility, he believes, of adding to his strength.

The fight for the speakership apparently has simmered down to two contenders, Hamilton and Frank J. Longman, of Portland, who has been given the pledges of the Multnomah delegation. Longman has been campaigning in upstate counties, but Hamilton does not think his own cause has been damaged.

HONOLULU, June 2 (AP)—Determination to resume their long flight to Australia "not later than Monday" was expressed today by the four men of the monoplane Southern Cross who arrived here yesterday, after riding the air 2,400 miles from Oakland in California.

HONOLULU, June 2 (AP)—Determination to continue their flight to Australia was reiterated by Captain Kingsford-Smith and his three flying companions today after a successful flight from the Oakland airport to Wheeler field yesterday.

Face to face, in the largest hangar at Wheeler field, the "Southern Cross" rested last night with the tri-motored "Bird of Paradise" the plane in which Lieutenant Maughan and Hagenberger made their epochal flight in 25 hours and 50 minutes. The "Southern Cross" made the cruise in 27 hours and 28 minutes.

Suva or Opolo?
The aviators were faced with making a decision as to next landing place: Suva, 140 miles from Hawaii. The second hop is recognized by aviators as the most perilous of the journey and the facilities for landing at Opolo were recommended by the British consul here as being better than those at Suva.

STATE FIRE LOSS
IS GROWING LESSTotal Damage in Oregon
for 1927 Given at
\$5,036,065.99

SALEM, Ore., June 2 (AP)—The annual fire loss in Oregon is gradually being reduced, according to the annual report of Clara A. Lee, state insurance commissioner and ex-officio state fire marshal.

For the seven year period 1921 to 1927 inclusive the report shows a total loss of \$60,263,123.44, an average of \$8,609,017.63. The total loss for the five year period 1922 to 1926 inclusive was \$49,266,277.84, an average of \$9,853,255.57 annually. The loss for 1927 was \$5,036,065.99, a reduction of \$4,817,199.58 compared with the average yearly loss of the previous five years, or 48.9 per cent. The loss for 1926 was \$4,955,857.69, or \$4,819,791.70 greater than in 1927. The decrease in loss has been effected notwithstanding the number of fires.

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MUSOLINI IS
REJECTED BY
PRESS CLUB

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—The name of Benito Mussolini, premier of Italy, proposed two weeks ago for non-resident membership in the national press club was withdrawn last night by the board of governors following protest by members.

J. Fred Essary, president of the club, sent a telegram to Mussolini two weeks ago congratulating him on his election as a non-resident of the club and sending the best wishes of fellow members.

The protest was signed by 25 members of the club who objected to Mussolini being a member because of his treatment of the press in Italy and because it was contended the by-laws had been violated in notifying Mussolini of his selection.

Appoint Baker To
Court At Hague

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—President Coolidge has appointed Newton D. Baker of Cleveland, Ohio, secretary of war in the cabinet, as the fourth United States member of the permanent court of arbitration at The Hague. Secretary Kellogg, in announcing the appointment today, said Mr. Baker had accepted.

Accidents Over

Fatal To ThreeSeveral Injured in Colli-

Deschutes.

BEND, Ore., June 2 (AP)—Falling into the Deschutes river late yesterday while he and his two brothers were helping in hauling a boat upstream, Burton Lytle, 11, was drowned. His brothers, Harold, 14, and William, 13, dove in to aid and were themselves saved by Merne Stimpson who was in the boat they were hauling.

REDDING, Cal., June 2 (AP)—A boulder blasted from a section of highway in Trinity county yesterday killed William K. Schaner, foreman for a construction company. He was 39 years old and a native of Iowa. He left a widow and a child.

EUREKA, Cal., June 2 (AP)—Dr. Francis Bayne, retired dentist was killed here yesterday when his light truck left a mountain road 60 miles southwest of Eureka, on the Eureka-Hot Springs road.

Dr. Bayne's body was crushed between the car and a tree, his wife escaped injury and walked three miles to summon help.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 2 (AP)—Two women were injured perhaps fatally, and one woman and four men less seriously hurt, in a collision early today between an automobile and a milk truck on the base line road, one mile east of the city.

In the automobile were three students of North Pacific Dental college, and three women. They had attended graduation exercises for two of the students and were taking a ride when the collision occurred. The injured:

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Italian Fliers
Set New Record;
In Air 58 Hours

ROME, June 2 (AP)—The Italian aviators Major Ferrarin and Captain Del Prete, landed at 3:52 this afternoon at Montecelio field, having broken the world's record for a duration flight. They were in the air for 58 hours and 37 minutes.

Major Ferrarin and his companion, flying an S-64 plane took off at 5:15 a. m. Italian time, Thursday morning covering a circuitous route over the Montecelio air field.

MURDER CHARGE
Filed Against
G. F. Masterson

PORTLAND, Ore., June 2 (AP)—George F. Masterson, sought for five days in connection with the death of Mrs. Marjorie Stoy following a drinking party in his room, today faces charges of first degree murder following report of the county grand jury late yesterday.

Police failed to pick up the trail of Masterson after he changed clothes at the Sackawaw hotel about 5:30 o'clock Tuesday morning, probably a half hour after Mrs. Stoy was shot and left naked and dead in Masterson's room.

Police are positive that Masterson threw his pocket book and cancelled checks in the river in an effort to throw police off the trail.

Prisoner Refuses
To Aid In Escape

PORTLAND, Ore., June 2 (AP)—En route to Portland from Astoria, where he was arrested with Robert E. Kennedy as suspected member of the "Snootie" Johnson postoffice robber gang, Amos E. Jones, 31, attempted last night at St. Helens to smother his guard and escape.

Arthur Johnson, deputy marshal, reported that Jones threw an overcoat over his head as he sat on a car seat opposite, but that Kennedy refused to aid in the attempt. The train conductor came to the assistance of Johnson and Jones was overpowered.

WALL STREET
IS AGAINST
MR. HOOVERSo Says L. F. Strauss Be-
fore Senate Campaign
Funds CommitteeTAMMANY DENIES
GIFTS TO SMITHGeorge W. Olvany, Sach-
em, Declares That the
Hall Is Patriotic and
Non-Political.

NEW YORK, June 2 (AP)—The general sentiment in Wall streets is against the nomination of Herbert Hoover, Lewis F. Strauss, of Kahn, Leach and company, testified today before the senate's presidential investigating committee.

Strauss, a former secretary to Hoover, made this statement when he was asked if his firm had made any contribution to the Hoover-for-president fund. While his own banking house gave no money, Strauss said, he personally had raised around \$50,000 for the commerce secretary's campaign fund.

Tells of Gifts
He said that Julius Rosenwald, chairman of the board of Sears, Roebuck and company, had contributed \$10,000; Henry I. Moses, a New York attorney, \$2,500, and V. E. Macey, of New York, \$2,000. Strauss told the committee he had sent some of the money to the Washington, D. C., headquarters and that he still had some on hand.

He was directed to furnish a complete list of contributions and expenditures.

Tammany has made no contribution to the campaign fund of Governor Alfred E. Smith. George W. Olvany, a sachem of the Tammany society testified today before the senate presidential campaign investigating committee.

Says Tammany Patriotic
Denying that Tammany is a political organization but said it was a patriotic society which has its headquarters in a place called Tammany hall.

Tammany society is a patriotic one and does not take part in politics, Olvany said.

"In the minds of the public Tammany is regarded as a political organization," said Senator Barkley, democrat, Kentucky. "That's because the democratic county commission of New York has made its headquarters in a building known as Tammany society," Olvany said. "It's there by sufferance only."

"Opposes the Rich"
"The Tammany society has nothing to do with politics," Olvany declared. "It is a society which was organized 100 years ago by act of the state legislature. George Washington was a sachem of it. It took the side of the poor against the rich."

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GRAFT IN N. Y.
BUREAU TOLD
BY FOREMAN

NEW YORK, June 2 (AP)—A story of graft in the New York street cleaning department with the amount involved estimated between \$5,000,000 and \$7,000,000 was in record today in the trial of two suspended officials of the department.

The estimate was made by William J. Loughed, suspended foreman as a witness for the state in the trial of Charles A. McGee and William J. Oswald, his superiors in the Bronx division.

Loughed, who had been in the department for 30 years, said that in 1915 he decided to get some of the cash money himself and that in 10 of the last 13 years he had actually witnessed the theft of \$700,000 from the city through payroll padding.

Although he said his conscience always hurt for every "dollar" he testified that he had personally collected about \$100,000 in graft since 1915.
