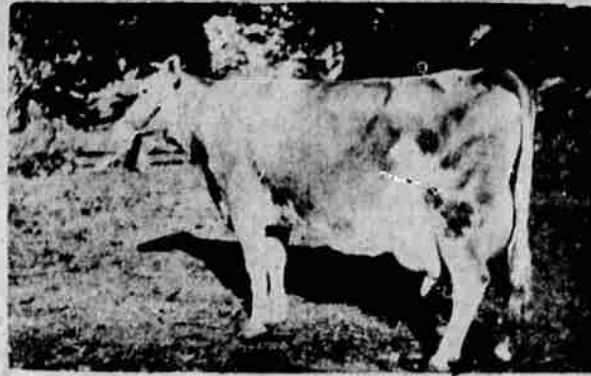
Attend Convention—

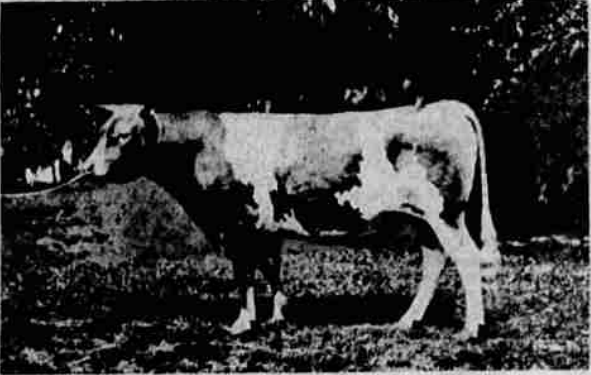
Big Day at Fish Pond—

Dairy Industry Shows Gains in Eastern Oregon

To those who are in close touch with activities over the valley, it is well known that the dairy industry is assuming increasingly large proportions in this section of eastern Oregon. There are a number of different breeds of dairy cattle found, some fine registered herds, some of high grade animals, and until recently the two most popular breeds having been the Jerseys and the Holsteins.

Within the last few years there has been an introduction into the county of the Guernseys and the numbers of herds, the size of herds and the quality of the herds have improved until now, it is said, there are about 20 owners of Guernseys herds of dairy cattle, and many of them are of fine registered animals, others entitled to registry but papers never having been secured.

C. M. Ogilvie of near the Cove has been perhaps one of the most enthusiastic owners of registered Guernseys and has done much, not only to interest but to enthrone his neighbors. Mr. Ogilvie's herd consists of about 25 head. He has recently purchased from the Cascade Guernsey farm a fine young bull calf sired by Beechwood Zero King, grand champion bull at the Oregon State fair of 1926 and out of Cascade Brunette, grand champion cow of the Oregon State fair of 1927. Mr. Ogilvie says interest in registered Guernseys is good and the demand for young animals is much greater than the supply.

Mr. Ogilvie is also leader of the Guernsey club, with several members, all of whom intend to exhibit stock at the Union show. On this page are found cuts of two fine animals, the grand dam and sire of Mr. Ogilvie's new bull.

Mr. and Mrs. John Collins have 12 head of Guernseys, one purebred heifer and one purebred bull. They also have among their twelve head, two or three grades which merit registration. Mr. and Mrs. Collins are very enthusiastic over their herd. They believe this breed to be better adapted to this climate; they are not nearly as nervous as some of the other breeds; they are good milkers, and while they do not give as much as the Holsteins, perhaps, they give more than the Jerseys.

Harlan Koeper of Cove is another enthusiastic Guernsey man. Leonard Dale who recently moved into this valley from Walla Walla county and lives on the Lorenze place, has the Guernseys. J. E. Mills has recently entered the Guernsey ranks by purchasing a fine animal from the southeastern part of the county and Katie Hudson of near Imbler has recently brought to his Guernsey herd a registered bull purchased up in Washington.

These are only a few of the owners of this breed of dairy cattle, but they are very much pleased with the records made by their herds and are satisfied that they have chosen wisely, they report.

A SEASONABLE RECIPE

Rhubarb Custard Pie

Mix—
1½ cups sugar,
2 tablespoons flour,
Butter the size of a walnut.
Mix above ingredients thoroughly.
Add 1 cup rhubarb cut very fine with two eggs beaten separately. Put narrow strips of dough across the top of the pie and bake in a moderate oven.

LIVESTOCK SHOW TO OPEN AT UNION ON TOMORROW MORNING

Tomorrow is the day toward which not only Union residents, but all Union county and all Eastern Oregon, in fact, has been looking for some time—the opening of the Eastern Oregon livestock show. This is the twentieth time this show has opened up at Union, and while this year it comes under a little different name, it is the same show and will have the same support, or greater from this section of the state.

Everything today points to a successful season, according to the different officials. Exhibit stalls are practically all taken, there are more race horses by a good many on the grounds today than have been for many years. Ben Jory whose bucking horses, steers and buffalo are to furnish considerable of the entertainment during the three days session reports his outfit to be in better shape than they have been and give much more promise for some thrills each day of the show. The exhibits are coming in nicely with new names of exhibitors on the list.

Commencing with tomorrow morning, the show opens each day at 8 o'clock, the morning sessions all being free. And, by the way, tomorrow is free day for all children in the county fourteen years of age and under. The morning of each day will be devoted to the judging contests by the members of the boys and girls clubs, the Smith-Hughes teams and in the open classes.

Each afternoon the big parade will move at 1:30 o'clock and this will be followed by the racing events of the afternoon. The daily programs have not yet been arranged but will be circulated each morning, that they may be as nearly accurate as possible. There are to be big things each evening, according to the officials. Toby Walker's big tent show opened up last night and will give nightly performances. They are said to be a real drawing card during the week. Then there is to be the annual stock show dances each evening, which have always attracted capacity crowds.
