150 HELD UP BY ARMED ROBBERS

Six Men Make Escape with Newspaper's Payroll of \$65,000

DETROIT, Mich., June 6 (AP)—Six men armed with sawed-off shot guns held up more than 150 persons in the Detroit News building shortly after 11 a. m. today and escaped in an automobile with a greater part of the newspaper's weekly payroll the total of which was \$65,000.

Some of the money was dropped in a dash from the building and during a gun fight in the street in which one patrolman was probably fatally wounded.

Leaving their car parked in front of the newspaper plant the robbers dashed up a stairway to the second floor. Some of them covered the 150 or more employees in the business office with shot guns while others leaped over the top of the cashier's cage and hurriedly scooped up all the money in sight.

Warning the employees to "stand back" the robbers then rushed from the building into the heavy traffic on LaFayette boulevard where they were engaged in an exchange of shots with two officers.

More than a dozen shots were fired. None of the bandits was believed wounded.

Campaign Costs Of Presidential Candidates Given

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—Making its final pre-convention report, the senate investigating committee today listed the campaign expenditures of all presidential candidates in both parties at \$741,087.74 of which amount more than half was attributed to Secretary Hoover.

The expenditures of Hoover for the republican presidential nomination were placed at \$380,822.11. He headed the list of 18 candidates examined by the committee which has concluded its work until after the convention when it will examine election campaign expenditures as well as other primary expenses.

MOSCOW HOPES FADE

MOSCOW, June 6 (AP)—Emotion in Moscow caused by a growing belief that the Italia had come down on Franz Josef land east of Spitzbergen gave way to vague doubts today when at least one of the 808 messages thought to have been picked up in Siberia turned out to be a false alarm.

It appeared that the amateur station which yesterday reported hearing the Italia, mistook radio instructions sent out from Moscow concerning rescue planes for the missing dirigible's call.

The failure of the big Siberian radio station which has been calling Noble regularly at intervals of ten minutes to secure a response, has caused further misgivings.

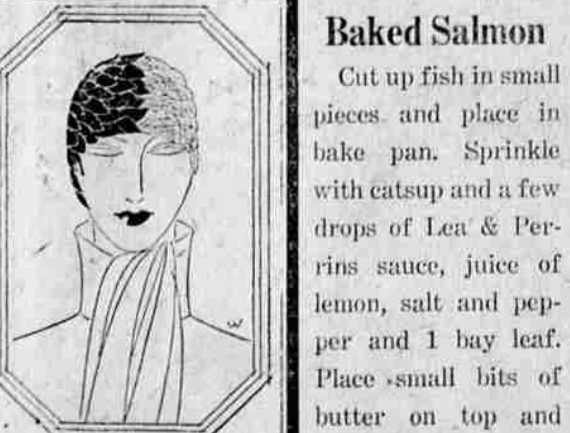
