Oregon Beauty Spots Told By La Grande Man

BAKER, Ore., June 6.—For geological wonders, scenic beauty and diversified resources, there is no state in all the union which equals Oregon, declared Harley H. Richardson of La Grande, who has traveled extensively over the entire country and who gave his lecture "See Oregon First," before the Kiwanis club at the Antlers grill yesterday.

Richardson recommended a ten-day trip of 17,000 miles in which he declared many of scenic Oregon could be seen in any similar distance of travel. Leaving Baker he would take the motorist to John Day, then over the central Oregon highway to Bend and Prineville, with a detour to the Crooked River canyon, over the McKenna pass, back to Bend, then to Crater Lake, down to Klamath Falls, over the mountains to Ashland, over the Pacific highway to Corvallis, thence over to Newport, over the Roosevelt highway to Astoria, then up the Columbia highway and Old Oregon Trail to La Grande, with a side trip to Walla Walla and back to Baker. He described in some detail the beauty spots to be found along this route.

STANDARD EGGS SELLING HIGHER

No Change in Butter Values—Price of Cherries Is Irregular

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6 (AP)—Standard eggs, both extra and firsts, were selling 1/2 cent higher on local wholesale markets today at 27 1/2c per dozen. Receipts yesterday were light at 905 cases, while in the market mostly by buyers for storage purposes. Storage holdings last night were reported at 62,472 cases.

No changes were quoted in butter values and trading was active at steady prices today. Yesterday's receipts were 18,510 pounds, with storage holdings reported at 239,600 pounds. Country dressed meats and poultry were steady and unchanged. Although a few local cherries have been coming in during the past few days, the quality has been mostly mediocre and prices irregular. California cherries were scarce early today, supplies limited to small offerings of Bing and Tartarian. The Bing was of good quality and sold as high as 25 cents per pound.

Strawberry prices were about steady yesterday with the best offerings bringing \$1.25 per crate of 24 pints. Supplies were liberal.

Aimee In Wreck; Escapes Unhurt

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6 (AP)—Aimee Kempe McPherson, evangelist, and five members of her party, narrowly escaped death early today in an automobile wreck in the isolated Horse Heaven country, between Yakima, Wash., and Arlington, Ore.

The heavy car, driven by Fire Chief Hawkins, of Yakima, went off the road when a steering knuckle broke. The car plowed through a fence, frightened a herd of horses and overturned between two telephone poles. None of the persons in the car was hurt.

Polish-Lithuania Agreement Fails

GENEVA, June 6 (AP)—A resolution in the league council demanding quick settlement of the Polish-Lithuanian dispute, was defeated this afternoon. Premier Waldeck-Rousseau, of Lithuania, alone voted against it, but unanimity is required, including the parties in dispute.

Marshal Chang Is In Grave Condition

MUKHDON, Manchuria, June 6 (AP)—Colonel Dolgus, Japanese military advisor, stated today that Marshal Chang Tso-Lin was still in a grave condition and that he had not yet regained consciousness.

Lewis To Wrestle

MEDFORD, June 6 (AP)—Strangler Lewis, world's champion heavyweight wrestler, will wrestle Billy Shaw of Marion, Ohio, in a match tomorrow night, under the auspices of the American Legion post. The bout will be staged in the arena and a crowd of from 100 to 200 persons will be on hand. Shaw, weighing over 200 pounds, is regarded as the stiffest competition Lewis will meet on his present tour and the contest is creating much local interest.

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—Dr. Clarence True Wilson, corresponding secretary of the board of temperance and public morals of the Methodist Episcopal church, announced today that Bishop W. P. McDowell, of Washington, has been elected president of the board. Advisory members elected included Willis C. Hays, of Oregon; Addison T. Smith, Idaho; and John W. Simmers, Washington state.

Radio Drops 10 Points In Wall Street Frenzy

NEW YORK, June 6 (AP)—Rumors of a further increase in discount rates started a broad selling movement on the stock exchange today, which wiped out many of the early gains and sent a number of issues 2 to nearly 10 points below yesterday's final quotations.

The selling movement reached its climax after the rate for call money had been cut from 6 1/2 to 6 per cent. Radio was the hardest hit, dropping from an early high of 20 3/4 to 19 3/4.

Wheat Unsettled And Some Higher

CHICAGO, June 6 (AP)—Opening unchanged to 3/4 cent higher, wheat afterward scored substantial general gains. Corn, oats and provisions all likewise showed an advance, with corn starting 1/4c off to 1/2c up, and subsequently rising all around.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1 1/2 to 2c net higher; corn 1/2 to 3/4c up, oats showing 1/2 to 3/4c gain, and provisions varying from 1/2c decline to a rise of 7c.
