Logan and Bryan To Face Action

PORTLAND, Ore., June 7 (AP)—Suit was filed in Tacoma, Wash., today against Logan & Bryan, seeking to recover \$36,203 in securities alleged to have been turned over to the New York firm by Overbeck & Cooke, which went bankrupt in January. J. G. Anderson, Portland attorney, said he would file the suits in behalf of Emma Chappelle, who claimed a loss of \$11,455. The balance of \$24,748 represented claims transferred to the plaintiff by other parties.

Standard Eggs Jump Again In Today's Market

PORTLAND, Ore., June 7 (AP)—Standard eggs continued to advance today, both grades rising 1 1/2c to 2 1/2c per dozen. Trading today was active, with the bulk of receipts going into storage, although local and outside demand was active. Yesterday's receipts were heavier than during the past few days at 1,352 cases. Storage holdings last night were 63,913 cases. Butter prices were unchanged today but trading was active and nothing to speak of was accumulating on dealers' floors. Yesterday's receipts were 17,539 pounds and storage holdings 298,561 pounds. Poultry prices were lower all around this morning, all classes of chickens being quoted about a cent under yesterday's figures. Young ducks were in over-supply and prices weak. Country dressed meats moved fairly well, except lambs, which were inclined to drag at prices ranging from 22 to 23c. Other classes were quiet, with better most offerings going to the trade at \$1.25 @ 1.40. Some hold-over stuff went cheaper and some really choice crates brought as high as \$1.50. Many berry growers are declining to harvest their berries at prices lower than those above quoted, as they insist they cannot sell under \$1.25 and still show a profit. The market was therefore more moderately supplied with first class stuff than during the previous week.

Close Heavy In Stock Exchange; Bears Gain Top

NEW YORK, June 7 (AP)—Reactionary tendencies predominated in today's stock market despite repeated efforts of bulls to revive bullish enthusiasm. Extreme nervousness over the political and credit situations led to heavy liquidation of stocks by frightened investors and speculators and aggressive selling on the part of the professional element. Bulls were heavy throughout, while the rallies in the industrials failed to hold. Violent recessions took place in some of the high priced specialties for which there is a thin market. Adams Express, United States Iron Pipe, Case Threading Machine and American Express were hammered 8 to nearly 11 points below yesterday's final quotations, while Manhattan Electrical Supply, General Asphalt common and preferred, National Tea, American Linedred, and International Telephone sold down 3 to nearly 5 points. The closing was heavy. Packard and Motors was rushed up around 4 1/2, the year's high, on rumors of a new motor combination, but the general list did not show much responsive power, although a few speculative movements snapped back in an impressive manner, including Jindlo and Wright Aero. Total sales approximated 3,000,000 shares.

Wheat Unsettled And Much Lower CHICAGO, June 7 (AP)—Opening 1 1/2 to 3c down, wheat rallied a little, and then dropped lower before. Corn, oats and provisions weakened also, with corn starting 5/8 to 1 1/4c off, and later continuing to sag. Wheat unsettled, 2 1/2 to 3c net lower, corn 3/4 to 1 1/2c off; oats 1/4 to 1 1/2c down, and provisions unchanged to 3/4c decline.
