Part of the \$25,000 will build a new house and buy furniture for Andy's mother, and some of the money will take Andy through college, he hopes, these will be enough to make his brother and sisters happy, too.

As he trotted at the head of the cross-country race, Andy said he had never dreamed of sharing \$25,000 with the family.

The runner's parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Payne, and their six other children live in a small shack, hardly in need of paint. It is by no means an imposing place, but Andy's friends point out that it bears some resemblance to the inn

which he had to bear the tape when Andy finished, and he went to New York to see him and the contest.

In the father's absence, Andy's 15-year-old brother, Hansell, looked after the crops. The mother would have been happy, too, to go to the scene of Andy's greatest triumph, but she "just couldn't leave" the younger children: Mary Beth, 14 years old; Page, 12; Fawcett, 10; Charles Alexander, 8; and Will Rogers, 6.

Rainier Park To Open Season On June 15, Report

TACOMA, Wash., June 8.—Rainier national park opens June 15 for its 29th annual season. It was announced here today by park officials. All tourist facilities in the park will resume operation at that time, the announcement said.

For the first time in the 29 years of the park, Portland and Longview will be connected with the national park by direct stage service, which will be inaugurated this year. The service will be daily, like that from Seattle and Tacoma.

The park is still under a blanket of snow which is expected to last well into the summer. Automobiles travel for miles through 12 and 26-foot snow drifts, carried out by government steam shovels to allow the passage of traffic. On the high plateaus reached by the snow, hundreds of varieties of wildflowers bloom in profusion in the spots melted free of snow. The vivid contrast of snow and flowers, side by side, is one of the park's most noted features.
