Captain Kingsford-Smith returns to his Australian birthplace today a true hero of the air. He and his three comrades have written new aviation history, even though it's been with a fool-hardy pen. Gradually new pages are turned. It's only a question of a few years until some equally daring crew will make the first non-stop flight clear across the Pacific—across all other unconquered portions of the earth's surface. Air conquests are just beginning.

One of the reasons we have so many people interested in promoting world peace in this generation is that so many people know what world war is. We had more than two million men overseas ten years ago, more than that in service at home. Thus finding how disagreeable, how terrible war is, they've been more thoroughly "sold" on peace. To them have been added the millions who have gained a clearer idea of the horrors of war from motion pictures of the late war, from stage productions similar to "What Price Glory." One of these very effective pictures is being shown at the Arcade theater. It is extremely forceful as peace propaganda, extremely interesting in that it depicts the German side of the war.

A GREAT SLOGAN

Military organizations live on traditions. Lawrence's "Don't give up the ship!" has been an inspiration to American bluejackets for over a century. So has John Paul Jones' "I haven't begun to fight yet." Now a marine captain dying in the Nicaraguan jungle, adds another injunction that the nation's fighting men will long remember.

Captain Robert S. Hunter was leading a marine patrol in combat with Sandino's men. A bullet pierced his neck; he fell, but would not withdraw. The fighting grew hotter. Captain Hunter struggled to rise, and got another bullet in the chest. He fell back, dying. To a marine who bent over him with a first-aid kit he managed to murmur: "Don't go back! Go ahead!"

Those were his last words. His detachment obeyed him, scattered the rebel band and gained its objective.

One likes to think that his words will be remembered for years to come. They are in line with the marines' tradition. An admirable slogan for this band of fighters, we think—"Don't go back! Go ahead!"—an admirable slogan for anyone, anytime.

SHORTAGE SEEN IN SPUD MARKET

Prices on New Potatoes Decidedly Firm—Cherry Demand Good

PORTLAND, Ore., June 9 (AP)—Serious shortage threatens the new potato market within the next week or two and prices on the local wholesale way are already decidedly firm. Hot weather in California made the moth situation acute, practically all growing districts reporting serious infestations by the pest. Local jobbers are having difficulty in getting potatoes. Whites were selling at \$3.25 per cwt. here today with indications of even higher prices.

King cherries have begun to arrive from The Dalles and were in excellent demand today at 20c per pound. Shipments so far have been small, but are expected to increase materially next week.

Berries were a little easier this morning, good quality stuff selling from \$1.25 to \$1.65 per crate, a few higher. Raspberries were coming in moderate quantities but the season will not really commence until the middle of next week, dealers say.

Except for an increase of a half cent in quotations on firsts to 32c per pound, butter and egg prices were steady today. Yesterday's receipts were: Butter 20,264 pounds; eggs 2,651 cases. Storage holdings were: Butter 443,420 pounds; eggs 64,167 cases.

Country dressed meats and poultry were notably steady this morning. Although trading was rather quiet, continued heavy receipts of all classes of chickens have quieted the market and further reductions are probable the fore part of next week.

NEW YORK, June 9 (AP)—Stock prices continued to yield to heavy liquidation for both accounts in today's brief session of the market. Rallies were feeble in character. Extreme declines in the active issues ranged from 1 to 5 points, with United States Steel, General Motors and other recent leaders sagging to the lowest levels of the week.

There was nothing in the day's trade news to influence the price movement. Weekly mercantile reviews reports further irregularity in business. Call money was not affected as was Friday's rate always carries over the weekend.

Selling pressure was most effective against the high priced specialties. Radio ran up three points to 19 1/4 and then dipped to 19 1/2. American Bank Note, International Telephone, United States East Iron Pipe and American Republics sold down four to nearly six points. General Motors, American Telephone, Wright, Curtiss, Reading, Southern Pacific and Delaware and Hudson, were among the many issues to decline 2 points or more.

The closing was heavy. Total sales approximated 1,400,000 shares.
