NO PERMITS TO BUILD LAST WEEK

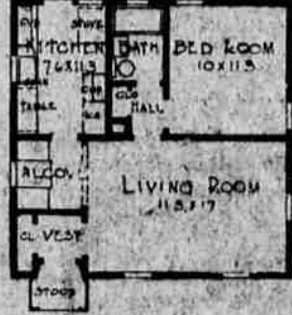
Calls for Construction of Home on W Avenue Near Fir Street

Building permits were issued in La Grande last week by Recorder J. E. Stearns. One in favor of J. M. Stevens, who is to erect a new home on W Avenue between Fir and Division streets. The estimate of the cost is \$1,500. The permit was issued on June 4.

Hardy R. W. Woolley took permit to alter and repair his home on Fourth street between Second and Lake avenues. The estimate is approximately \$75. No permits have been taken in La Grande during the last two weeks but building activity continues over the city.

A BUNGALOW GARAGE

There are many people living in a crowded apartment in our larger cities who feel at the beginning of summer, that they would like to get out of the cramped apartment, into the open, so why not consider a "Bungalow Garage."

The one here shown, is large enough for two good sized cars. Built on the rear of a lot, the construction is similar to our garage buildings. A concrete floor slab is poured on the ground, this can be covered with linoleum, or rugs, as the case may be. The inside partition studs, as well as the ceiling is covered with some plaster substitute. This can be painted, or left in the rough, the joints covered with batons. It can be carefully removed, and used on the ceiling of the new home at a later date. With a little air tight stove, one can get through the winter comfortably in this home, if constructed in this manner.

From the second story, one enters the living room from a vestibule. In one end of the living room is placed a dining alcove, with built-in table and seats. The kitchen is complete, of the buffet type. Electric stove and electric refrigerator, one has all the modern conveniences.

The one bedroom and bath, is reached from a small hall, where a coat closet is provided for.

The exterior walls are covered with wide siding painted white; the roof either a stained wood shingle, or an asphalt shingle. Green shutters. This little home, should be built in almost any locality for from \$500 to \$1,000, exclusive of heating and plumbing.

should be practiced more vigorously for the later crops than for the early spring crops which had a greater supply of moisture. Carrots should be thinned to four inches apart as soon as large enough to handle and the beets should be similarly treated, thinning each little tuft of plants to one. Beets always come up in tufts because the "seed" is in reality a fruit containing several seeds. These germinate in the fruit and come up very thickly no matter how thin the individual fruits may be sown.

Cultivation to keep the soil stirred into a dust which is essential for the speedy growth of these summer crops and they will show the results plainly.

Swiss chard for greens may be sown at any time until mid-July as it makes speedy growth and will furnish a good supply of its big yellowish green leaves in short order. The leaf growth will be much more rapid if they are thinned to six inches apart. When crowded in the rows all the leaves are smaller. The response to more room will be immediate.

Refrigeration Is Problem In Most Families

In nine out of ten families in the United States, food is kept in such a way as to be a menace to health. This is the startling and sweeping assertion of Frederick Dammann, M. D. in a recent series of articles in Popular Science covering a year spent in investigation and the testing of thousands of household refrigerators.

In reporting on these investigations Dr. Dammann says that he found in the vast majority of homes either an ice-box at all or one that was not efficient enough to check the growth of microbes in milk and other foods.

"They show food," he says in one article, "that most people are ignorantly satisfied with refrigerators in which butter doesn't melt and milk doesn't sour in 24 hours utterly oblivious of the possibilities of insidious treachery in the ice box."

The articles point out that violent or fatal illnesses are not the only ones that result from use of food that has been improperly preserved. Where the decomposition of food, while serious enough, it is less degree, only slight illnesses may result, the writer says.

Dr. Dammann declares that most American families use cheap, poorly constructed ice boxes that have little or no practical value as refrigerators. He says that a good refrigerator must be built properly to keep out heat and insulated with material able to resist the heat waves that are constantly trying to creep in.

Fifty degrees is the danger line and food kept above that temperature soon begins to spoil. Dr. Dammann declares at the same time asserting that few household refrigerators maintain any such temperature for any length of time, the failure being due either to faulty construction or to insufficient ice.

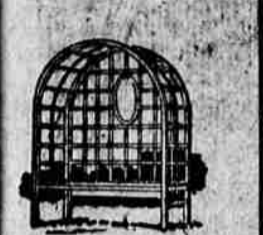
