AERIE CONVENES THURSDAY MORN

Several Prizes Offered to Delegates—Large Attendance Expected by La Grande Members.

A huge parade, in which every delegate is scheduled to appear, on Friday afternoon is to be one of the features of the Oregon Eagles convention that will begin here tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock with a general assembly and public welcoming program.

Chief to Lead Parade

Chief of Police Clint Haynes will lead the parade with the municipal band following. The float of the La Grande aerie No. 255, P. O. E., the drill team of the Ladies' auxiliary to the La Grande lodge, the officers and members, the aerie drill team and the officers and members, all state or grand aerie officers, who are present, all visiting delegates, the American Legion drum corps, the Campfire girls, the Boy Scouts of America, merchant floats and dealers' cars will participate in the procession.

KANSAS CITY, June 13 (AP)—The resolutions sub-committee of the republican national convention today reached an agreement on all points for the parties platform except that on farm relief, which will be left to the full committee for final determination.

Build Mess Hall Immediately At Boy Scout Camp

Immediate construction of a mess hall on the grounds selected for the summer Boy Scout camp on Catherine creek, was decided today following an early morning visit to the proposed site by a subsidiary of the grounds committee under E. Russell Scott. The committee found that an ideal spot had been selected just 25 miles from La Grande on the Hall ranch, well off the highway. The main stream of the creek is about 100 feet from the wooded grounds, and small streams also trickle through. Wide areas of grass plots are as green as a well kept lawn, with tall pine sprinkled liberally over the area, and heavily wooded areas fringing the green "centerpiece" where the fire circles will be held and where the boys can lounge at leisure moments. On the opposite side of the creek proper, the mess hall will be constructed by salvaging buildings already on the grounds but now useless. The territory is reported by the committee to be ample in size and perfectly located, grass lawns, fishing grounds and splendid hiking territory.

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INVENTION STRENGTH IS FOR HOOVER

Second Day Brings Test Vote on Seating of Texas Delegates

ANTI-GROUP GETS A MINORITY VOTE

Senator Moses Takes over Chairmanship—Next Session of Caucus Scheduled Tonight

By Byron Price (Associated Press Staff Writer) CONVENTION HALL, KANSAS CITY, June 13 (AP)—In a session like a play with the leading characters left out, but which none the less provided one more visible proof of the complete control of the Hoover cohorts over the party organization, the republican national convention today, instead of its permanent officers, settled a fiery delegate contest from Texas and then recessed until 7:30 o'clock tonight.

By Byron Price (Associated Press Staff Writer) CONVENTION HALL, KANSAS CITY, June 13 (AP)—The second session, republican national convention, was called to order by temporary Chairman Foss at 10:37 a. m. central standard time. Foss announced that thousands of seats reserved for spectators still were more than half empty.

The late comers was pouring in in increasing numbers, however, adding to the confusion and the noise.

Without waiting for any real quiet in the hall, Senator Foss, with one desperate stroke of his big wooden hammer, introduced the Right Rev. Thomas F. Lilla, of the Roman Catholic diocese of Kansas City, who ordered the opening prayer while the delegates stood and became silent and a spluttering candle light shown on the floor.

Demands Arrive While the prayer was being offered, the farm demonstrators, after a morning pep meeting showed up outside the convention hall. They walked on the footways but made no immediate attempt to gain entry. Neither the convention sergeant at arms nor the police guard stationed everywhere at the entrances appeared to be at all concerned.

The invocation ended with the Lord's prayer, repeated in season by the standing delegates and spectators. At the "Amen" conversation again broke all bounds of the holding and continued while Foss announced the acceptance of a resolution made of Utah copper and presented to the conventions by the Utah delegation.

Applaud Roosevelt The temporary chairman then took a minute to correct a mistake he made yesterday, when in attempting to deliver his keynote speech from memory, he forgot to mention the name of Roosevelt in his roll call of the achievements of the republican presidents.

As he repeated the praise he had intended to give to Roosevelt, the convention rose and applauded for a half minute, the first real show of spirit in the day's proceedings. There was a waiting of a few minutes while a messenger was on his way to the hall with the report of the credentials committee and Senator Foss turned the convention over to the band. It began by playing "America," with most of the audience standing and joining in.

While the band played on the farm relief bloc from the north-west was its first bid for a hearing in the convention hall. P. D. Norton, of the North Dakota delegation trying to make himself heard above the band music, shouted a parliamentary inquiry whether it would be in order to have some address to the convention.

"It would not be," said Senator Foss. The North Dakotan added that he had wanted to move that Senator MacMaster make a speech. The chairman merely shook his
