Eight big league battles saw 31 pitchers pounded for 183 hits on which 103 runs were scored. Sixty of the hits were for extra bases—23 doubles—11 triples—and 16 homers.

The heaviest shelling of the day was in the Philadelphia sector of the National League. Here the Pittsburgh Pirates cracked out 28 hits to beat the Phillies 15 to 4. Kromer, a sad disappointment this season, returned to form and gave

the Quakers only five safeties, two of them, however, home runs.

Behind Benton's strong pitching, the New York Giants hatted out 15 hits to crush the league leading Cincinnati Reds, 10-1.

The St. Louis Cardinals moved to within one game of the Reds by taking over the Braves at Boston 5-6, in a wild game.

Shut out for five innings by Charley Root, the Brooklyn Dodgers suddenly came to life and battered out a 13 to 1 decision over the Chicago Cubs.

**Yanks on Spry**  
In the American league the Yankees have run their way to a 15-7 triumph over the Chicago White Sox. Babe Ruth hit his 23rd homer; Lou Gehrig his 14th and 15th.

Pitchers came into their own in the other three games. Ed Morris of the Red Sox rookie right hander beat the St. Louis Browns 5-2, allowing seven scattered hits. The Washington Senators made it three in a row over the Cleveland Indians, 3-2, behind Jones' good pitching. Jimmy Fox's single in the eighth scored Cochran with the run that enabled the Philadelphia Athletics to beat Detroit 3-2.

## LA SALLE BACK AT TOP IN SLUGGING

Marlow Dethroned by His Teammate—10 Hitting Above .300 Mark

La Grande and Walla Walla hitters suffered considerably last Sunday, particularly the Pirates. With only three hits added to the season's total, everyday's batting average took a slump and the team hitting dropped from .290 to .256, although this is still good enough to lead the Blue Mountain league.

La Grande, however, still has the individual batting leadership, with Tony LaSalle cramped on top of the boys who have played in six or more games, with the fat mark of .404. Tony started out the season in the lead and then was knocked out by Marlow and Stokke about mid-season. Marlow and Stokke, however, hit a slump against Erickson, neither getting a safe hit in two games, while Tony batted 1.000 in one contest and .333 in the second.

Powell is definitely listed among La Grande's heavier hitters now, following his showing in three league games.

**King Leads Buckaroos**  
King, Pendleton, with six games to his credit, is leading his team mates with a mark of .550. Although Yenny and Bailey, two college lads, have hit .500 in a couple of games, Hypczinsky is really the Bears' best hitter with a percentage in six games of .272.

## "Big Seven" Marshals Oarsmen For Annual Title Race; Ten Eyck Back

NEW YORK (AP)—About every existing variety of college rowing equipment will be trying for the intercollegiate championship in this year's race at Poughkeepsie, June 13.

They are a picturesque septet, these men behind the oars, and all kinds of rowing environments bred them—from the low-lying, salt-soaked country up around Cape Cod to the lakes and estuaries of the Pacific Coast, and from the old school of professional oarsmen to the present generation who learned their craft in colleges.

Both the intercollegiate championship Columbia crew and the Navy eight which will attempt to regain its old supremacy are coached by native products of a part of New England where men still go down to the sea in ships. They are the Glendon, father and son—Old Dick at the Naval Academy and Young Dick at Columbia. Helping the latter is his brother, Hugh, whom Rich is starting in at Columbia as his father started him at Annapolis.

**West Represented**  
The west, with three, has the biggest representation among the seven head coaches now assembling on the highlands of the Hudson to train for the big grind and all are products of the University of Washington.

At Ellerslie, on 25 the young-est head coach of rowing in the country, stroked the Washington eight on the Hudson two years ago and replaced Rusty Callow as coach this season after Callow, another of the coast-trained coaches, shifted his activities to Pennsylvania. The third western-trained coach, a Poughkeepsie, is Ky Elbright of California, a former oarsman at that same great rowing institution—Washington.

Outstanding among the coaches of the older generation, we have Jim Ten Eyck of Syracuse, now 79 years old and in his 25th year as head coach of rowing at Syracuse. Jim can look back on a lifetime at the oars and still can hold his own with any man in a single scull. Light as he was in his rowing days, he was one of the best in the world in his time.

Jim at Syracuse has a little help this year in Chailey Whitson, a former Orange oarsman, but he still "rows the boat" and his own homey, but effective theories of "making a boat go" are still in force. Syracuse, like the Brooklyn National League ball club, has had its greatest rowing success in presidential years. Ten Eyck hopes for something on the Hudson despite his dreary showing in losing three races to the old Orange rival, Cornell.

Last of the seven, there is Jim Wray of Cornell who teaches rowing with a slightly English slant. This is his second year with the Red boys and he has had time now to get started the rowing system which enabled Harvard to beat Yale six times between 1905 and 1914 when Wray was coaching the Crimson.

## 30 Indians Will Start Marathon Tomorrow Morn

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13 (AP)—The theories and some funny ideas will get healthy workouts during the running of the Redwood highway Indian marathon which starts in San Francisco tomorrow and will have its ending in Grants Pass.

Most of the 30 Indians entered intend to wear shoes or moccasins—some will alternate with barefoot running. In last year's race some of the contestants encased their feet in wet green leaves. Others wrapped rolls of cloth around their feet.
