TILLAMOOK, June 13 (AP)—Sought since last July, when he disappeared in Josephine county under circumstances indicating drowning Roy E. Johnson, former manager of the Southern Oregon Gas company at Grants Pass, has been arrested here and is held at the jail to face charges of forgery and embezzlement. Johnson was recognized here recently by Ted Law, of Garibaldi, who had known him at Grants Pass. He denied his identity when accused by Law saying his name was Robert Leonard. Investigation, however, convinced officers that the man was Johnson. He was arrested here Monday night and yesterday admitted his identity. Johnson went on a fishing trip with Ralph Payne on the Rogue river and Payne missed him, finding his fishing pole on the river bank. Later Johnson's hat was found in the stream. Officers suspected that he was not drowned and a search was instituted.

OCEAN FLIERS ARE WELCOMED TO MELBOURNE

MELBOURNE, Australia, June 13 (AP)—The trans-Pacific monoplane Southern Cross, carrying its crew of four and two passengers flew from Sydney to Melbourne today in six hours, encircled the city and landed perfectly at Essendon air port while 80,000 spectators roared a tumultuous welcome. The crew, Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith and Charles Ulm, Australian pilots, Navigator Harry Lyon and Radio Operator James Warner, Americans, were greeted as they swept over the city by an escort of nine planes. In the ship were Captain Kingsford-Smith's mother and Ulm's wife. The eager crowd of spectators swarmed on the landing field and covered all the hill tops, buildings and every available open space in the vicinity to greet the fliers.

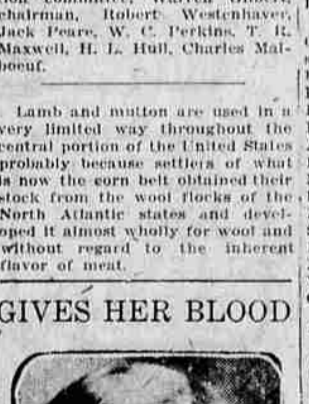
