Bebe Daniels At The Arcade Theater Today

The play might be the thing but it doesn't interest Bebe Daniels very much unless it is crammed with laughs. This was proved last night in the Paramount star's latest comedy release, "The Fifty-Fifty Girl," which opened at the Arcade theater today. And laughs there are, plenty of them.

In the first place, Bebe tackles the problem of the modern young woman who is imbued with the idea that she can take the place of the man and make the latter like it. With that as the major premise, Miss Daniels travels along a rather rocky road of situations until finally she puts out the call for help.

The story of "The Fifty-Fifty Girl," written by John McDermott, concerns the attempt of Miss Daniels to run a gold mine like a man while her partner, James Hull, assumes the obligations of the woman.

It goes along fine, to the accompaniment of a steady string of chuckles, until Miss Daniels runs up against a bunch of villains who are attempting to get the mine away from her and Hull.

Miss Daniels is fortunate as regards the supporting cast. James Hull is back with her as a leading man and his last appearance with her in "Swim Girl, Swim" and, as usual, is splendid.

William Austin, seen with Miss Daniels quite often, makes a fine type for a stupid mining engineer whose experience has been gained entirely from textbooks.

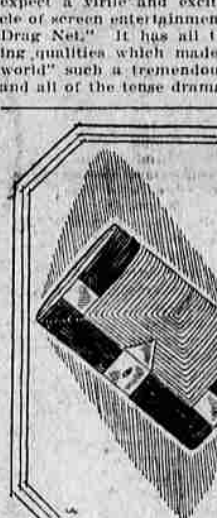
George Koisanos and Johnnie Morris are the other featured members of the cast.
