BERRIES CHEAPER SUPPLY IS LARGE

Cherries in Poor Demand and New Potatoes Are Weaker

PORTLAND, Ore., June 13 (AP)—Berries were cheaper today with supplies of good stuff large. Best cherries sold at \$1.25 per crate but the average price was around \$1.15.

First local raspberries of the season began coming in larger quantities yesterday also. They were unusually fine berries and sold rapidly at \$3.50 per crate of 24 boxes.

Cherries were in poor demand. Best Blings selling around 20c per pound while other softer varieties went a-begging at \$1.25 per 20-pound box.

New potatoes were weaker, declines averaging about 25c per sack on all grades and varieties.

Butter and egg prices were steady and unchanged. The market continued to display activity and a firm tone prevailed throughout.

Portland, Ore., June 13 (AP)—Opening wheat after record moderate gains all around. Corn and oats were easy, with corn starting at 1/4c to 1/2c advance, but later showing declines.

Wheat closed heavy, 1/2c to 2/3c net lower; corn 3/4 to 1/2c down; oats 1/4 to 1/2c off, and provisions unchanged to 1/2c decline.

Bullish Trend Predominant In Exchange Today

NEW YORK, June 13 (AP)—Responding to the placing of large supporting orders and the buying of "bargain hunters" stock prices made a brisk recovery today after the disastrous break of yesterday.

A few soft spots cropped out here and there, but the general trend was upward. Standard industrial and rail rallied one to five points.

The closing was strong. Recovery of yesterday's losses, and a good deal more besides, was accomplished in the meteoric rise of the afternoon, which pushed many high priced stocks from 5 to 12 points above the previous close before they filtered on.
