EAGLES OPEN CONVENTION HERE TODAY

then discussed the old-age pension act which has been passed in seven states. "It is the most human bill on the statutes," he said, making a plea for its passage throughout the nation. "We will never give up till the Eagle old-age pension is on the books of every state in the union," said Mr. Bigelow. "It is a compensation for services well rendered in being productive worthy American citizens," he concluded.

Nelson Speaks
A. W. Nelson, was introduced as representing the chamber of commerce and as secretary of the Old Oregon Trail association. He spoke briefly saying that La Grande desired above all that the Eagles should feel perfectly "at home" in the city. He touched particularly on the trip to Wallowa Lake and declared no delegate should miss that part of the convention.

An address by the state president, short in duration, in which he thanked the La Grande speakers, ended the first session.

Increased Membership
At the regular state lodge that followed recess the president and the secretary made their annual reports. Of particular interest was the listing of the year's increase in membership in various areas. Klamath Falls has had a 14 per cent increase, Medford a 123 per cent, Salem, 166 per cent and Bend, 79 per cent, with a general increase in every area.

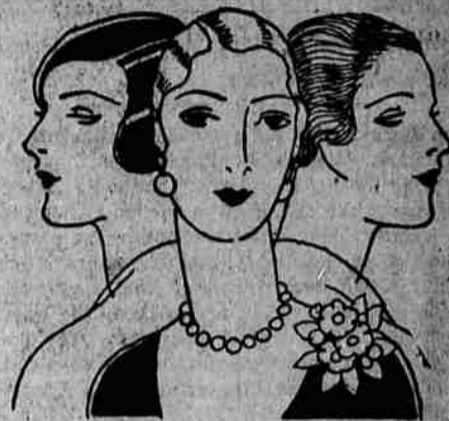
