Easy HOUSEKEEPING

Drainpipes and toilet bowls — must be watched

When I was a young woman, keeping house was play until it came to cleaning pesky things like drainpipes and toilet bowls—then I would have cried!

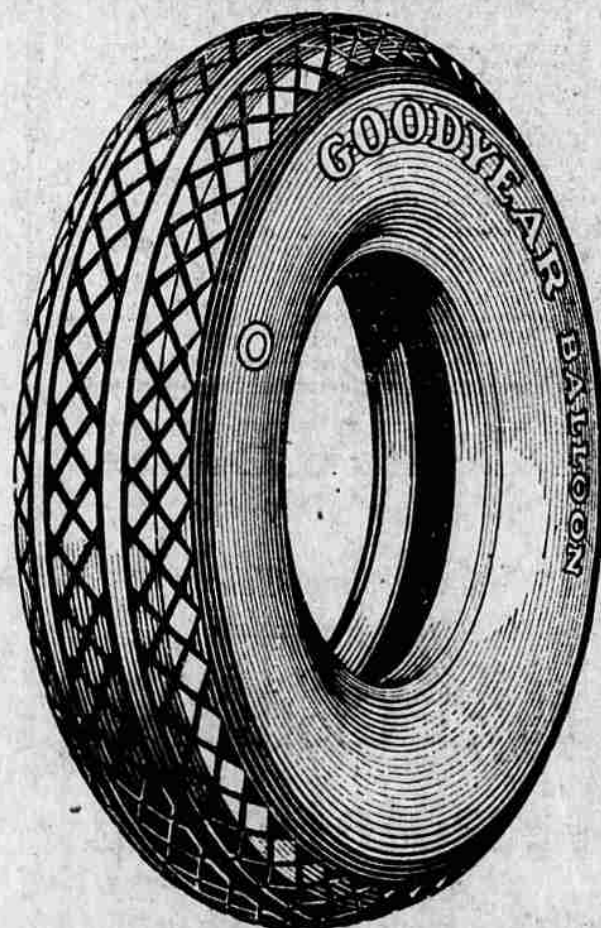

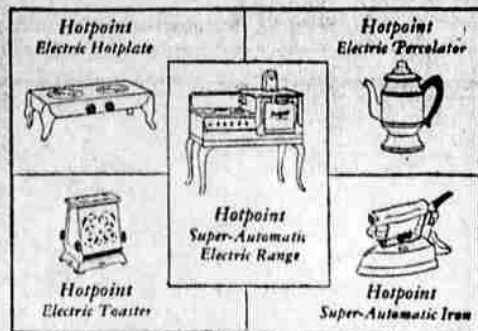


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
