

## FRUIT PROSPECTS IN OREGON GOOD

Apple, Pear, Cherry Outlook Bright—Western Prune Crop Ruined

The extension service of O. A. C. and the news columns of various county papers give the following indications as to this year's fruit crop in Oregon:

**Apples**—Prospects are for a crop closely approximating that of 1926. The Hood River crop is expected to be about three times that of last year, but somewhat less than in 1926. Umatilla, Union and Malheur counties give promise of a production greater than in 1926, and the Rogue River district will probably about equal the production of two years ago.

**Pears**—A record production of pears appears to be in prospect. The commercial crop is expected to be close to 4,000 cars. Both new bearing acreage and maturity of young trees are contributing factors.

**Prunes**—In Western Oregon about 10 per cent of a normal crop. The eastern prune crop is reported as being about normal. The Milton-Freewater crop is seriously estimated at 900 to 1,200 cars. At many other Eastern Oregon points where prunes are grown a good crop is forecasted.

**Cherries**—The Western Oregon crop is quite "spotted," but the production will probably be little less than last year. The Eastern Oregon crop will be more than double that of last year, as there have been no severe damaging frosts in that section this year.

## Flora Highway Celebration Is Wallowa Event

**ENTERPRISE, Ore., June 14 (Special)**—Another mile stone was set in the history of Wallowa county when people from all the county and adjoining counties in Oregon, Washington and Idaho met on the newly completed Enterprise-Flora highway near Appleton and there celebrated the event with a monster picnic which was one of the outstanding events in Wallowa county. The town of Enterprise closed up all business houses and hardly enough people were left in the city to man the fire hose had there been need of it.

County Judge L. E. Jordan of this city was master of ceremonies and a very interesting program was furnished in the morning before dinner was called. Judge Wm. Duby, former highway commissioner and who was a friend of the road during his term of office, was the principal speaker of the day and among other things warned the people against the proposed three dollar auto license. He stated that road builders from all over the world were coming to Oregon to study our methods and that Oregon enjoys the distinction of having the best system of highways of any state in the union. Following Judge Duby, J. A. Burleigh, of Enterprise, gave a short address reviewing the history of road conditions to the north end of the county during past years and prophesying a new era of prosperity to that section as a result of the new modern highway. Community singing was led by Mrs. A. K. Parker and several songs and readings rounded out the morning program.

After the picnic lunch which was served on immense long tables provided especially for the purpose, the sports program was taken up and races, ball driving contests and a ball game between the business men of Enterprise and the North end farmers took up a full day. Not a small part of the enjoyment of the day was furnished by the Legion drum corps from here. These two musical organizations alternated in keeping something different every minute and the attractive uniforms mingling with the immense throng of people added color to the picture with its background of pines overlooking the wonderful Joseph Creek canyon an immense fissure in the earth that drops over two thousands feet below the highway which parallels it for many miles.

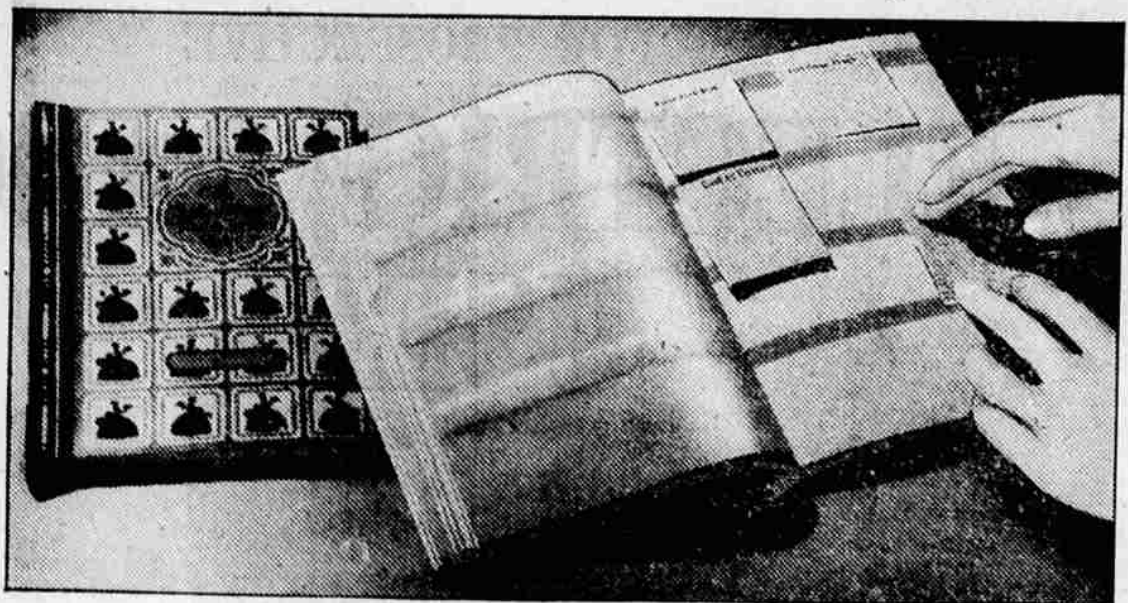
**CUBA-CANADA TRADE GROWS**
